#### MOTHER-DAUGHTER LUNCHEON...








#### CONTEST.,

#### WHAT KIND OF FROG ARE YOU??

Permit me to share with you an article that appeared in the Spring 1979 LWML Quarterly, written by Ursula Glander.



Once upon a time were two frogs. They were brothers. They lived together in a spring house. One day one of the frogs fell into a vat of cream. As he felt himself slowly sinking he thought, "Why do these things always happen to me? I have always tried to be a good frog." And as he continued to feel so sorry for himself, he slowly sank, smothered, and died.

Shortly afterwards, his brother from the looking for him and fell into the same vat of cream. "Oh "he thought, "I'm really in trouble, but I've always heard when there's life, there's hope." He churned and churned so madly that the cream turned to butter and he jumped out free.

What kind of frog are you? A simple illustration, but with such depth of meaning when told by a man struck by unexpected blindness in the prime of life. He further emphasized his graphic illustration by saying that handicaps come to many people in all shapes and sizes —some obvious, some hidden—mental, physical, emotional...and that blindness is no different than any other kind of handicap. It is how you accept and live with the handicap.

I would like to think that the little frog who churned and churned after overcoming his handicap did not remain basking on his lily pad, but forgot about himself and, as he touched the lives of many, shared both himself and his blessings.

Often we put off visiting certain people because "we wouldn't know what to say." One friend recently confided, "I have many acquaintances. They are well-meaning, but they do not really care. A friend cares." Cares--the way Jesus does. What a friend we have in Jesus.

Our Lord never promised that life would always be plaasant, free of pain, hurt, sorrow, anxiety. He did give us a life to live-one day at a time. And he says, "Come unto me." "Ask whatever you wish, and it shall be done."

We go by clocks and calendars. God goes by eternity. Sometimes he answers our prayers immediately. Sometimes we wait and wait. We know the answer will come. It may not the answer we prayed for, but it will come in God's good time in the way he knows is best for us. So we come to him-daily and often in prayer. For it is only as we come that we find we are then equipped to:

- ... reach out with his compassion, not pity
- ... show his love, not our sympathy
- ... share his time, not a few moments snatched from our business.

Are you churning away? What kind of frog are you?

candies, home canned items, or whatever. They are sure to sell like hot cakes as usual. We would like to have at <u>least</u> three items from each lady, so plan ahead and put them in your freezer if you like. If you are going to be out of town, call Thelma Haines at 879-1611 (work) and 879-1108 (evenings) to make arrangements for your baked goods. She has plenty of room in her freezer to hold these items for the sale.

For folks who need high altitude recipes, we suggest you call Alma Baldwin, 879-3952 in the evenings. She has been bringing lots of goodies to our sales each year and will be glad to help.

SUGGESTIONS: Wrap your items well to the p them from drying out. Put a tag on each, showing what it contains trans, raisins, kind of fruit, flavor, etc.) If you like, put your name on it...people have come to look for certain people's baking from year to year. Put a suggested price on it, or show about how much the ingredients cost, and we will mark it up at the sale. If you can only bring one item, that is okay. Cookies wrapped in smaller packages often sell better, say 3 or 6 to a package, and also cupcakes.


