



The following letter was sent by Rev. Ralph A. Phipps, president of the Rocky Mountain District, to the pastors of the District:

"Dear Brother:

You have probably read in the news media that a Constitutional Amendment which will effectively prohibit the use of public funds for abortions will be on the November ballot for Colorado voters. Representatives of "Citizens"

for Responsible Government", the group which carried out the initiative to gain signatures for the ballot proposal, have visited my office and have asked me to call to your attention the wording which will appear on the ballot. That wording you will find at the bottom of this letter.

This group also is asking all churches to participate in a fund drive to raise monies for a media campaign supporting the adoption of the amendment. I have indicated to Citizens for Responsible Government that I am not in a position to endorse their offering. However, I did agree to inform you of their intention.

If any of you feel that your congregation whishes to participate in providing media funds for this group, you may contact Mr. Brad Marcus at 303-635-8276.


I have always been very cautious about becoming involved in the name of the Church with special interest groups who may have their own agendas. At the same time by conviction and by support of our church body's stance on the issue of abortion, we do need to speak up for the rights of the unborn and for the sanctity of life.

The wording which will appear on the November ballot is:

Shall there be an amendment to Article V of the Colorado Constitution prohibiting use of public funds by the state of Colorado or any of its agencies or political subdivisions to pay or reimburse, directly or indirectly, any person, agency, or facility any induced abortion, but permitting the general assembly, by specific bill, to authorize and appropriate funds for medical services necessary to prevent the death of a pregnant woman or her unborn child if every reasonable effort is made to preserve the life of each?

#### REFORMATION NOTES...

He was born in 1483 (9 years before Columbus discovered America) ...studies law at age 18...became a priest at 23 and a Doctor of Theology at 28...took a stand for reform at age 33...was excommunicated and became a fugitive at 38 ...translated the Bible into German at age 40...died at age 63, an internationally-admired leader.



467 years ago, on October 31, 1517,

Martin Luther nailed his "95 Theses" to the church door in Wittenburg, Germany. He wanted to debate some current practices and teaching of the Roman Catholic Church that he felt were not Scripturally sound. Little did he know that this action would mark the beginning of the Reformation.

Luther put the Church back onto a sound Scriptural foundation. His translation of the Bible into German enabled the lay people to have copies in their homes that they could actually read and understand. It upset Luther very much that the forgiveness of sins was being sold to people in the form of "indulgences" (pieces of paper that declared forgiveness). He knew and proclaimed that our forgiveness and salvation comes through our faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. It cannot be purchased by money or by any amount of "good works".

We live in that Reformation faith that hangs onto Jesus Christ alone and looks to him for life and salvation. To him alone be the glory!
