

GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF OUR RISEN LORD!

What happens when a horse falls out of a horse trailer while traveling down the freeway at 65 mph.? What happens when you find a \$1,700.00 bull with a broken leg while you are moving your herd of cattle from one pasture to another?

"It is the hope of creation that it will be liberated from its bondage to decay and be brought into the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth. The creation waits in eager expectation for the children of God to be revealed." (Romans 8:19-22)



Sick cattle, broken legs of bulls, horses falling out of trailers, weeds dominating a field that is used to pro-. duce food, an infestation of pests that rob a field of a high yield, lightening that destroys homes and forests, tornados that kill, unpredictable frost that devastates a crop, drought that does not know the boundaries of nations, floods that destroy.... The list is endless!

Many people claim that "communing" with nature is a marvelous way to worship God. Often (it is said by many) that a fifteen minute pause on the tractor on Sunday morning is an adequate replacement for Sunday worship. "Just pause and look at the grand creation!" Hunters speak of the "hunting-high" as they commune with God and nature as they stalk the animal or bird of their choice.

Granted, creation is awesome in its displays of power, might, beauty and interrelated ecological systems. Look at a high mountain-alpine lake. Look at a sunset as it paints its moving mosaic across the canvas sky. Watch the moon rise over the

Yampa Valley. Watch a doe and fawn grazing in a mountain meadow. Watch a flock of geese making their way south as they anticipate the coming of winter.

We know only a part of God when we simply observe HIS creation. We know His imagination. We know His creative genius. The observation of nature has its brutal and utterly violent side. That side of creation forces honesty.

If you set on a tractor on Sunday without the promise of the Gospel, you encounter a God who seemingly doesn't care about His own creation. It is only a matter of time and honest perception before you see nature as it truly is...a brutal, fickle and unpredictable home.

Paul says in Romans chapter eight that creation is in bondage. Creation is plagued by decay. Creation groans. Creation waits. Mankind's fall into sin in the Garden of Eden, his desire to be equal with God (to be as God) hrew creation into a "tailspin." Until the Savior returns, creation will be groaning.

God, nature's creator, revealed himself in Jesus. Jesus was God. He calmed the sea. He stilled the wind. He walked on the water. He, as God, had mastery over His creation.

That same Jesus comes to us in Word and Sacrament. That Jesus died on Calvary. All of creation went dark and groaned at the death of the one who calmed the sea. Jesus died for you, for me, for creation. Jesus rose for you, for me; for creation. Jesus Is.

As the creation awaits the master to return, let us wait together as we worship together. Worship nature and you practice idolatry. Worship Jesus, nature's author. Come, let us join together on Sunday to hear about the one who calmed the sea, stilled the wind, walked on water and forgave the sins of the world.

THOUGHTS ON PREVENTION

This war on drugs may be very destructive, in that it reinforces the misconcenties that alcohol is somehow a softer or less worrisome drug than marijuana, cocaine, crack, heroin, PCP, what have you. All of those other drugs are extraordinarily dangerous and destructive, but they are not the drugs that are killing the greatest numbers of young people or leading them to the greatest numbers of problems. Alcohol Is. Yet our whole society is looking the other way. If the kids want to have a Spuds MacKenzie party, they say, "At least they're not on drugs." Well, they are on drugs—the most dangerous drug.

Part of the discomfort adults feel about these discussions is that they have to review their own use of alcohol and their own attitudes about it. They have to look at whether, in fact, they go out on Saturday night, have a few drinks, and then drive home afterwards. And I'm talking not about people with alcoholism but people whe don't treat alcohol as a drug in their own lives.

The father who may not be an alcoholic, who always consumes a sixpack of beer while watching the game on television on Sunday afternoon, may be glying a terribly dangerous message to his children. The mother who cannot conceive of entertaining anyone in the home without offering them cocktails beforehand may be planting an idea of necessary association between alcohol and socializing that does not exist in reality but will stay forever in the kid's mind. Adults have to think about how they use alcohol themselves, what their own views about it are, whether they're able to practice what they preach, whether they can give the same message to their kids about alcohol that they would about any ether drug: "Ne, you may not drink. This is against the law, and it's dangerous, and i won't have it." Period.

I get calls all the time from reporters saying, "You can't tell a parent that he has to tell his kids they can't have beer on prom night or after a game or at a party in the basement." Well, we say you can and you should.



The Mite Box Story

Just Where Do Those Mites Go?

Based on the Biblical story of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1-4), the mite box in intended for regular contributions of "mites"—offerings above and beyond the support you give to your congregation and the synod. Mite box contributions amount to millions of dollars that support district and international mission projects and implement the LWML program.

Mite boxes, available from the district or zone, are distributed to every woman in a society. Members are encouraged to keep mite boxes in a prominent place and contribute to them regularly. Mite box offerings are gathered at meetings, preferably with prayer or a mite box devotion. The society treasurer remits contributions regularly to the district treasurer.

When hiking or driving out in the desert or into the mountains of New Mexico, you should let someone know where you are going and when you plan to return. If you should get lost or stranded, so few people in such a large area means no one might come your way for days. But if notified, search parties are organized to look for those who do not return when expected.

This concern for those who get lost in the wilderness areas of New Mexico is mirrored in the Christian congregation. One reason for our being drawn together by God is to reach out for any member who wanders from the faith or even gets lost. Not only the pastor but also all of us as members of our congregation have the responsibility to pray for and encourage our fellow members so they don't turn away from Jesus, the only Savior, by outright evil living or by apathy toward their church.

Of course, if you realize that you are slipping away from that faith, if He who gave His life for you doesn't seem too important to you anymore, it is essential that you let someone in the congregation know, so they can help, strengthen, and encourage you.

HONESTY

In his recent book Integrity, Ted Engstrom told this story: "For Coach Cleveland Stroud and the Bulldogs of Rockdale County High School [Conyers, Georgia], it was their championship season: 21 wins and 5 losses on the way to the Georgia boys' basketball tournament last March, then a dramatic come-from-behind victory in the state finals.

"But now the new glass trophy case outside the high school gymnasium is bare. Earlier this month the Georgia High School Association deprived Rockdale County of the championship after school officials said that a player who was scholastically ineligible had played 45 seconds in the first of the school's five postseason games.

"'We didn't know he was ineligible at the time: we didn't know it until a few weeks ago,' Mr. Stroud said. 'Some people have said we should have just kept quiet about it, that it was just 45 seconds and the player wasn't an impact player. But you've got to do what's honest and right and what the rules say. I told my team that people forget the scores of basketball games; they don't ever forget what you're made of.""



ASSURANCE

n 1958, a U.S. soldier wandered the streets of Berlin to see the sights. Despite the bustling new life in parts of the city, reminders remained of the destruction of World War II.

Walking through a residential area one evening, across the cobblestone street he saw an open space edged with flowers. In the center stood the stone front of what had been a church. The building was no longer there, but the rubble had been cleared away in an attempt to fill the empty space with a little park.

The former church's main door was shaped in a Gothic arch, and over it was carved into the stone in German: HEAVEN AND EARTH WILL PASS AWAY, BUT MY WORDS WILL NOT PASS AWAY. As he stepped through the arch where the doors had once been, of course he wasn't inside anything. What was once a place of worship had been reduced to a patch of stone pavement and open sky.


