# VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL



# Reaching the unchurched

St. Paul, Boca Raton, Fla., has been effective in reaching the unchurched because of an extremely large outreach program. We do this by generating a "spirit of evangelism" throughout the parish.

We have many visitors—about 15 percent non-members in worship weekly. Many visitors are in worship due to a direct invitation by a member. Our members are excited about their church and their Savior and want to share that excitement. This feeling comes in part from an aggressive adult Bible study program—this is a must!

We realize many visitors are "church shopping." Our goal is that once they attend our service, their shopping is over. We put a lot of time and energy into having an exciting, "visitor friendly" worship experience. This is the one time in the week we have a large, captive audience; that hour needs to be the best it can be. Second best will not do. The Board of Lay Ministry has an agenda item each month where this point is discussed.



We practice the "rite of friendship" where all in attendance register their worship. These sheets are examined and letters sent to all visitors on Monday. If they list a phone number, the pastor calls on Monday to thank them for coming and see if there is anything that can be done for them. On Mondays, a small group of visitors tries to make a home visit.

Adult doctrine classes are conducted six times a year. These classes are held in a retreat setting on Saturdays. During this time, the basics of the Lutheran Confessions are reviewed. In 1993, 56 adults were confirmed. However, these classes are not considered to be the end of their studies, but rather, the beginning. It is imperative that they continue in some type of adult Bible class.

We recently confirmed a young Jewish mother who expressed her desire to join under one condition: "That we would continue to teach her." Again, this is crucial!


Again, the growth is due to a "spirit of evangelism" that is contagious throughout the congregation due to a love for their Savior that comes from involvement in the Word.

#### TV'S ALCOHOL FANTASY

Kids get a lot of their information about alcohol from television, where drinking is associated with happiness, material wealth, glamour, adventure, social acceptance, sexual satisfaction, and the excitement of fast-moving cars. Television characters consume six times more alcohol than people in real life, yet they rarely suffer blackouts, hangovers, sexual dysfunction, or fatal car accidents. In fact they rarely get drunk. Every hour of prime-time viewing contains four or five drinking episodes; children in the United States see 3,000 of these each year. By age 18 they will have seen 100,000 commercials for beer.

Adolescent Counselor magazine reports In its October/November 1988 issue that 8- to 12-year-old boys and girls were able to name more brands of alcoholic beverages than the names of US presidents. In a survey of 180 students conducted by the Center for Science in the Public Interest, "One young girl correctly wrote the names of 14 alcoholic beverages, but could only name four presidents," the magazine states. One boy "correctly spelled Bud Light, King Cobra, and Matilda Bay, but rendered presidents' names as 'Nickson' and 'Rosselvet,' Another named ten beers and wines, correctly spelled, but pencilled presidents as 'Ragon' and 'Aprilham Linchon.'"

According to a 1987 survey conducted by Weekly Reader, only 50 percent of fourth graders know that beer, wine, or liquor is a drug, compared to 87 percent who know that marijuana is a drug. Clearly, television advertising and programming have a powerful effect on how kids perceive alcohol.

Some critics call on television producers to present a more realistic picture; others want equal time for public health and safety messages; still others propose a ban on alcohol broadcast ads. In the meantime, as the media continue to bombard kids with distorted images of alcohol, parents can fight back by advocating and supporting school and community prevention programs, and by demonstrating in their own lives that drinking is not a prerequisite to having fun.


For mom: maternity clothes as the center operates a maternity clothing exchange.
