

GOD'S 'CONTRACT WITH AMERICA AND THE WORLD'



2 Samuel 22:50 (NAS)

The first 100 days of the 104th Congress ended with a legislative flurry not seen since the era of Franklin Delano Roosevelt and the New Deal. A hallmark of this activity was a document called the "Contract with America," a set of promises made by the eventual majority party in the House of Representatives to the American people. Whether you agreed with the objectives of the contract or not, it was nonetheless refreshing to see politicians making promises they intended to keep.

In an earlier time, God spoke to His people through the inspired authors of Holy Scripture. They recorded God's promises to believers in every time and place. We might regard these promises of God's as an unbreakable "Contract with America... and the World." Let's review some of them.

Read Gen. 3:14-15. What was God's first promise to a world suddenly lost to sin?

In the aftermath of the Great

Flood, God made a promise to the human race. What was it (see Gen. 8:20-

Read Gen. 9:1-17. What command did the Lord give to Noah and his family in v. 1?

What covenant did God establish with Noah in v. 11?

Did this covenant, or promise, apply only to Noah and his immediate family (see v. 9)? What was to be the visible sign of God's promise (see Gen. 9:12-17)? Read Gen. 12:1-3. What did God command Abraham to do? How would God bless Abraham and Sarah (see Gen. 15:1-6)? What would be the visible sign of God's promise to Abraham (see Gen. 17:9-14)? From generation to generation, God repeated His promises to the people of Israel. Read Gen. 26:1-5 (concerning Isaac) and Gen. 28:10-22 (concerning Jacob) to see how this is true.

Read Acts 13:23-33. Who is the ful-

fillment of God's promises?

to see why it was necessary that Christ's blood be shed to seal this new covenant between God and His people.

How does God's covenant with Abraham apply to believers in Jesus Christ (see Gal. 3:13-18)?

What is the visible sign of God's new "contract," or covenant, with His people (see 1 Cor. 11:23-26)?

As we await the fulfillment of

God's promises in these final days, what

assurance does He give us concerning

the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ

(see 2 Peter 3:9)? _____

When it comes to promises, we humans tend to break them as much as we make them. Some people live up to the terms of their contracts, while others don't. Thanks be to God—and praises, too!—that our new covenant with Jesus Christ is a binding contract, sealed with His blood.

How in the world have we been able to do it?

Concordia is wrapping up some major projects. The year long project of "parsonage" renovation is for all intents and purposes complete. A couple final outstanding bills and a couple small jobs to finish and then the occupancy permit will be approved. The new organ has been installed...and paid for! Thank God! During this time of remodeling and organ purchasing we have maintained a ministry and its financial budget. We have supported the many volunteer efforts of Concordia. We have kept our financial head "above water." Concordia's 1995 average Sunday attendance is 200+ per Sunday.

Some thoughts as Fall approaches.

As September approaches perhaps a bit of encouragement is needed regarding the caretaking of our congregation. I would like to offer some thoughts regarding three particular words: CONSISTENT, SACRIFICE, AND COMMITMENT. How can you become "consistent" in your care of Concordia?

Concordia needs the care of each one of its households. Without your care, your congregation cannot maintain, or move forward, with ministry. Your congregation needs your consistent care in order to bud and blossom. Members of congregations must mature in their understanding of "congregation-care." It is inappropriate to think that somebody else will carry the load. The load must be shared. Each person and/or household must shoulder part of the "consistent" care of the congregation. What does it mean to sacrifice for a congregation?

Each time a person gives an offering, volunteers hours of service, or attends worship or other ministry events, there is a degree of sacrifice made. A choice between two alternatives means that one is "sacrificed." The word sacrifice carries with it a degree of pain. Members must go through a bit of pain in order for a congregation to survive. Members must "sacrifice" in order for ministry to happen. Does the word "commitment" describe your involvement?

Commitment must be reflected in consistent worship attendance. Commitment must be reflected in the support of Bible study opportunities. Commitment must be reflected in financial giving. Commitment must be reflected in praying for each other and our joint ministry opportunities. You are not being encouraged to give BEYOND your means, you are being asked to give FROM your means.

Some concluding thoughts.

Jesus Christ committed His life, to the point of death, for you and I. He was committed to take upon Himself our sin, so that when He stepped free from the grave, we might have forgiveness and eternal life. He was sacrificed for us. Where we should have been eternally been lost, He was lost on the cross, so that we might be found. When He stepped free from the grave, we now are free from sin, death and everlasting condemnation. Jesus, through the work of the Holy Spirit, is consistently with us, encouraging and strengthening us.



Like any good American father, I took my six kids to see Walt Disney's "Pocahontas." As we have come to expect, the Disney Studios have once again provided us with creative, captivating and technically superior children's entertainment. Unfortunately, they have also provided us with revisionist pseudo-history fitting the mold of the politically correct, New Age, anti-

According to the Disney version, however, these same representatives of Western culture came only to get rich, find adventure, and kill Indians. Upon arriving, they began immediately to dig for gold and, according to the Disney screenwriters, "prowl the earth like ravenous wolves destroying everything in their paths."

prevalent term in Disney's "The Lion King" as well?) In the end, Pocahontas, contrary to historical fact, chooses to stay in America and keep her own religion and way of life.

Truth is no deterrent to those who wish to capture the minds of this and future generations. When history is an embarrassment to their beliefs, they simply rewrite it to suit themselves and their purposes.

Certain members of our congregation experienced this same sort of attempted brainwashing from the National Park Service when we took a delegation from our day-school to Jamestown. The Park Service has set up a Jamestown settlement that majors in Indian lore and the settlers' diet and effectively diverts tourists from the original site (about a mile farther down), at which the Christian convictions and character of the colonists are plainly etched in ancient monuments. Our bus driver told us that he had taken at least 20 school groups to Jamestown, and didn't even know that the original site existed.

That's selective history, and such history, like the revised history presented in "Pocahontas," is misleading history.

What Parents Want




