Well Josephine, God loves you in Christ! It was Concordia's turn to care for the ECC.





She began to cramp up - to the point where she could not run upright, but rather was kind of hunched over. She didn't quit. The pain got so bad that she started to cry. It's hard to breath when you're crying. It's hard to run when you can't breath. But she kept going.

All the runners in Sarah's race had long since crossed the finish line when she finally came into view. The participants were already lined up for the next race, when someone said in near astonishment, "Look, there's another runner still coming!" The crowd migrated from the starting line to the finish line to witness this moving event.

"What a courageous girl," someone said quietly. "Yes," I thought silently, "what a courageous girl." When Sarah was close enough for us to see the pain in her eyes and the tears running down her face, we too began to cry. Her parents, her sister, her brother, her friends, even people who didn't know her - we all wept with her. Someone began to clap. Then everyone clapped. We cheered through our tears. Sarah dropped to the ground as she crossed the finish line. Her team mates were there to congratulate and to console. Her pain soon gave way to satisfaction and a great sense of accomplishment. What a moment.

As parents we many times share in the suffering of our children, but this was the first time I had witnessed one of my children choosing suffering as the required road to a higher goal.

We will soon see Jesus in the manger again. It was his starting line. The race he ran was often filled with pain and suffering. Some might have looked at the cross and said he lost. But he suffered, instead, in pursuit of a higher goal. Thank you, Sarah, for teaching us that winners don't always, or even often, finish first. Thank you, Jesus, for being willing to suffer in our stead.

"My message today is on the parable of the Good Samaritan," Max announced. "Let me start with an illustration.



I THOUGHT YOU'D LIKE TO KNOW!

"Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young" was the name of a singing group in the 1970's. A line from a song of theirs came to mind recently.

"Teach...your children well...of their father's hell."

I bring that line to your attention because I began wondering what we hope to pass on to our children? What priorities do we want them to recall when they have left our homes, communities, and churches?

When it comes to Concordia, there are some things that I think we should bring to the attention of our children regarding the church that is their worship home. Maybe we all could use this reminder.

Concordia is presently giving this witness of hope to our children:

- 1. We monthly care for the isolated and shut-in at the Extended Care Center. We do so by our care of a monthly worship service. It is at this time that gracious contact can be made with the lonely and disregarded.
- 2. Concordia hosts a yearly Thanksgiving Community Worship service of which all the offerings go to help the homeless in our community. Last year nearly \$1,500.00 was given to this need from this event.
- 3. Concordia budgets \$2,000.00 annually for the care of people in crisis in our local community. The "Steamboat Community Outreach" is the destination of these funds.

- 4. Through Concordia's Women's Group, and our congregation's support of that group, nearly \$10,000.00 dollars each year is generated to care for missionary efforts, crisis care concerns, etc.
- 5. Each year Concordia has a fund raiser to sponsor "feeding the hungry" concerns throughout the world. This is done in conjunction with Lutheran World Relief. \$1,000.00 dollars a year buys a lot of grain which in turn feeds many starving people.
- 6. Each year at Christmas time Concordia is responsible for making Christmas possible for four or five families. Food, clothing, toys, etc., is provided for these families. We give from our abundance.
- 7. Individuals and families who struggle with medical bills have been cared for by fund raising efforts of Concordia with matching funds provided by Lutheran Insurance companies. In 1996 over \$1,000.00 dollars was provided.
- 8. Concordia opens its doors to those dealing with addiction and recovery concerns.
 Weekly meetings are held to assist adults.
 An annual 8 week session is held for young people dealing with this issue.

Teach your children well! Not of their father's hell, but of that bit of heaven! Teach them to give to the shut-in, the homeless, the hurting, the hungry, the sick, those in need. Your congregation has worked hard to establish these opportunities. If you do not tell your children, who will?
