

Spreading the Word through human care...

LCMS World Relief and Board for Mission Services have joined resources to open new mission fields in four countries. This work marks the first time that The Lutheran Church


- Missouri Synod will work cooperatively in Egypt, Eritrea, Croatia and China.

Women and children are the focus in Egypt where problems of poverty and financial inequities are common. The project, located in a rural region of Upper Egypt, provides a revolving loan program with lower than market rates. Literacy assistance and health awareness elements compliment the loan program, providing help to 1,000 families.

Thirty years of warfare has affected many in the country of Eritrea. Women and children are hurting. Programs that teach new skills to women will help increase economic opportunities for them. Sewing, embroidery, weaving and knitting skills give them a chance to provide for their families. They will also share the skills they have learned with others. Other women will train to become housekeepers in homes and offices.

The war of ethnic cleansing in the former Yugoslavia has left many women battle-scarred with traumatic memories. A soup kitchen ministry in Zagreb, Croatia is being expanded to provide a center where women share the trauma they endured and receive nurturing.

The elderly, the sick and young children all receive help in China. Many people living in rural areas around Yamchang cannot receive medical services because of their poverty. A new project grant will allow for these services. Elderly people living in government nursing homes will have improved living conditions. New textbooks for children in Harbin province will ease the already strained resources in this poor province.



Searching Scripture THE MODE OF BAPTISM

Editor's note: This is the last installment of Pastor Scherer's threepart "Searching Scripture" setting forth the Scriptural basis for the Lutheran understanding and practice of holy baptism.

While it is true that the primary meaning of the Greek word for "baptize" is to "dip" or "immerse." it is also true that in Scripture the word carries of ritualistic washing with water.

Read Mark 7:3-4. In this passage, we read about some of the Jewish customs in regard to ritualistic washings. The Greek word for "baptize" is used in v. 4. However, our versions rightly translate the word with the wider meaning of simply "wash," If "baptize" always means "immersion," then we would have to say that every time a Jew came from the marketplace, before he could eat, he would have to get into some vessel of water large enough for his whole body and completely submerge himself in the water. We know of no such practice.

Read Matt. 3:16 and Mark 1:10. These verses are sometimes alluded to as teaching immersion. However, they do not say that Jesus came up from under the water. Rather, they say that Jesus went up out of the water. In other words, He was baptized by whatever method, and then He walked up out of the water. Indeed, if these statements in Matthew and Mark are twisted to mean immersion, then, to be consistent, we must conclude that Philip immersed himself as well as the eunuch in Acts 8. since it says in v. 39 that ". . . they came up out of the water. ... "

Read John 3:23. Sometimes this verse is said to imply immersion. However, a careful study of this passage in the original language suggests exactly the opposite. Aenon is probably from the Aramaic, meaning "fountains" or "springs." The Greek says, literally, that "many waters" (plural) were there. This would indicate the springs themselves or the rivulets that flowed from them, not a large body of water. In fact, neither ancient nor modern records speak of any place like this that a wider meaning that includes any sort had enough water to immerse numbers of people.

Read Acts 8:36-38. This would seem to be the strongest passage to at least suggest immersion, especially if one is already disposed toward that method of baptism. Still, the passage does not say that Philip immersed the eunuch. The passage only says that there was some water that they could walk into. We don't know if the water was deep enough for immersion. In the geographical area that is the setting for this account, the problem would have been to find any water at all, let alone enough to immerse someone in.


Read Rom. 6:3. Oftentimes, this figure of speech is used as a "proof passage" for immersion. But it is only a figure of speech, and one does not build a doctrine on a figure of speech. In fact, this passage is not teaching anything in regard to the method of baptism. It is teaching us the meaning of baptism: that we are united with Christ in His death, burial and resurrection.

Read Acts 1:5 and 2:18. If one were to use a figure of speech to teach a particular method of baptism, then by comparing these two passages, one must arrive at the conclusion that to baptize means to "pour out on."

The Scriptures prescribe no specific method of baptism. Rather, any ritualistic washing with water may properly be understood as a baptism. A second-century Christian writing called "The Didache," meaning "The Teaching," bears out this conclusion. In it we are instructed to "... baptize in running water, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. If you do not have running water, baptize in some other. If you cannot in cold, then in warm. If neither, then pour water on the head three times in the name of the Father. Son, and Holy Spirit."

A word of clarification: Certainly, immersion is an acceptable method of baptism. We can even concede that it more graphically portrays the concept of our death, burial and resurrection with Christ. However, when it is taught that one's baptism is only valid if it is a baptism by immersion, such teaching is without Scriptural support and must be rejected.

We Lutherans are not just following the custom of Luther's day in our understanding and practice of baptism. We stand solidly on Scripture. It is hoped that this study will help you to answer those who say we don't.
