To the Members and Friends of Concordia:



## HOW'S YOUR ATTITUDE?

Take a moment and write down the name of one person you consider to be very influential in your life. Now write 10 things about this person that you admire. Next to each characteristic, note whether that trait is a "skill" or an "attitude."

If you've done the above exercise, you should find something very significant. About 80% of what you admire in someone else is attitude! If he is positive - that's an attitude. If she is loyal - that's an attitude. And if he is man of integrity - you guessed it, it's an attitude!

An upbeat, exciting class leader goes a long way in bringing the unchurched back into the church.

So many times leaders fret over the material they use, asking if it is interesting, relevant or inspiring. The material you use is not nearly as important as the attitude you display. God's Word is exciting! Learning about Him is fun! This is cool stuff! If you convey that attitude to your prospective members, you'll get them hooked! (Didn't Jesus say something about being a "fisher of men?")

FLOOD RELIEF UPDATE

Life is starting to return to some sense of normalcy for Our Redeemer Lutheran Church and it's members in Grand Forks, North Dakota. Our Redeemer is the church that Concordia adopted as a way to help our brothers and sisters to recover from the disasters of the 500 year flood of the Red River Valley.

Concordia to date has donated approximately \$4,000, plus matching funds of \$2,000 from an AAL Branch in Craig. In addition to the monies, a member of our congregation has donated a piano.


David Stephens, an Elder at Our Redeemer, stated that words cannot fully express the gratitude of it's members for the generosity, love and prayers of Concordia's congregation. The gifts are very much appreciated. They have now gutted the portion of the church affected by the flood, which includes the fellowship hall, Sunday school rooms, kitchen and mechanical rooms. Electrical service has been restored. (They used some of the funds from Concordia for this.) 'Builders for Christ' have now arrived and have started to insulate and sheet rock the basement. Damage to the members' homes ranged from partial to total destruction. Rev. Nissen, pastor at Redeemer, felt that most of the members have accepted their loss quite well but the uncertainty of the future now tugs at their heart strings. Things like jobs, rebuilding, friends moving, and landscape changes are very much a concern for the flood victims. Pastor Nissen urged us to keep them all in our prayers.

The Committee wants to thank everyone for their generous support. May God continue to bless this moment of grace as we are privileged to share the burdens of others. We will give you updates on their progress and keep you posted on ways that we can continue to care for our sisters and brothers at Our Redeemer. God Bless.

The word "biblia" was then coined to describe little books, and since the Scriptures are essentially that - a collection of little books - the word Bible was used to describe them.



## FAMILY ISSUES: Teens Face Risks to Health and Faith



At the stirring of puberty, our children blossom into young adults; in the process, they pass through the fragile and promising teen years. During those years a positive response to God's First Article gifts is critical to their continued development as Christians.

Yet during those years youth pass through a minefield of temptations that can cripple or even destroy the life God has given. A partial list includes:

- preoccupation with body image that does harm to physical health and assumes greater importance than their personal relationship with Jesus Christ. This preoccupation can develop into starvation dieting alternated with binge eating.
- tobacco use. Smoking is currently on the rise among teens and pre-teens. Addiction comes swiftly to this age group. Continued cigarette use forecasts almost certain later degenerative diseases affecting body systems critical to life and health.


- overeating with consequent obesity. The number of overweight Americans, children and youth included, is rising steadily. Boredom, low self-image, family example, television advertising—all create the stimulus for overnutrition and future diabetes, cardiovascular disease, skeletal misalignment, and joint damage. A genetic predisposition to food addiction makes moderation the more necessary.
- sexual promiscuity. In 1994, 20 percent of the legal abortions were performed on young women below 19 years of age. More than 50 percent of adolescents have experienced sexual intimacy by age 18. The prevalence of sexually transmitted diseases in this age group more than confirms the widespread abuse of this precious gift of God.
- the abuse of drugs. The use of marijuana among adolescents is on the rise and includes junior high school children.
- alcohol use and abuse among teens. Thousands of young lives are snuffed out each year on American roads by teens driving drunk; additional thousands sustain disabling and sometimes lifelong injuries.
- physically inactive youth. Physical activity declines drastically in adolescence (Surgeon Generals Report), especially among females. Enrollment in high school physical education classes for all students dropped from 42 percent in 1991 to 25 percent in 1995.

Many teens ignore the dangers of these lifestyle choices to their future health, alternately declaring a present "benefit" more important that a distant danger or holding to a pessimism that their life will need before they are adults.

Letting our youth stand alone before forces that threaten their gift of life and their life with Christ is unacceptable to Christian parents, pastors, teachers, congregations, physicians, and nurses. By their modeling, congregations can bring a powerful First Article presence before youth; pastors can give prominence to the First Article in confirmation class; families can teach and live appreciation for the gift of life in the home; physicians and nurses, as authority figures on practices that build or destroy human life, have special influence.

We cannot surrender to the notion that societal forces against the First Article are too strong for us to prevail. The gospel, given expression, will prevail.

#### **CREATION**

I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth.

What does this mean?

I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still preserves them;

also clothing and shoes, meat and drink, house and home, wife and children, fields, cattle, and all my goods; that He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life;

that He defends me against all danger, and guards and protects me from all evil;

and all this purely out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me;

for all which it is my duty to thank and praise, to serve and obey Him.

This is most certainly true.

## **MARK**

- Mark probably wrote for Gentile readers, particularly Romans. He shows Jesus as powerful and decisive, and yet as our humble servant. Much of Mark's gospel echoes the Servant Songs of the prophet Isaiah.
- We may divide Mark into two sections each depicting a part of Jesus' earthly ministry: to serve (chapters 1-10) and to sacrifice (chapters 11-16). Mark devotes over a fourth of his gospel to Christ's passion and resurrection.
- Mark writes powerfully, using a lean style and emphasizing action. He uses the word for "at once" or "immediately" 42 times. His style communicates the urgency of proclaiming the coming kingdom of God.

#### GET THE BIG PICTURE

Mark's gospel clips along. He uses the word "immediately" 42 times in his gospel, more than all the other New Testament writers put together. Watch for it as you read. Also note the way Mark presents Jesus - as the Servant come to save.

Read Mark 1-2. If time is short, focus on 1:1-15

#### SHARPEN THE FOCUS

What would you be willing to give up to have peace and security? Mark's first readers enjoyed the peace brought by the Roman

Empire. They could travel in relative security over the best roads that had ever been built. They did not need to worrry about invasions from their neighbors as had the people of Israel for so long during the time of the Old Testament kings.

Rome freed them from that but kept law and order by force. At the time Mark wrote, the Roman Caesar ruled with an iron fist. In the empire, human life was cheap. Just about everyone with authority in the government used it to make his own life more comfortable. The arrogance of power, we might say.

Now look at the picture Mark paints of the Son of God:

- In humility letting John the Baptizer be the instrument through which the Holy Spirit annoints Him for Ministry.
- In humility letting Himself be driven into the wilderness with the wild animals to be tempted.
- In humility caring for the sick and demon possessed, even *touching* the lepers!

Here, truly, was a gentle man - one who had great strength but who used it in compassion for others and in obedience to the Father; one who would - in strength and humility - even die for us!

**ZOOM IN** Note how Mark's narrative echoes Isaiah's prophecy about the Messiah (42:1-3). The Suffering Servant of Isaiah took on flesh and blood in the person of Christ Jesus.



Patriotism - July 4

All "isms" run out in the end, and good riddance to most of them. Patriotism for example.

If patriots are people who stand by their country right or wrong, Germans who stood by Adolf Hitler and the Third Reich should be adequate proof that we've had enough of them.

If patriots are people who believe not only that anything they consider unpatriotic is wrong but that anything they consider wrong is unpatriotic, the late Senator Joseph McCarthy and his backers should be enough to make us avoid them like the plague.

If patriots are people who believe things like "Better Dead Than Red," they should be shown films of Hiroshima and Nagasake on August 6 and 9, respectively, and then be taken off to the funny farm.

The only patriots worth their salt are the ones who love their country enough to see that in a nuclear age it is not going to survive unless the world survives. True patriots are no longer champions of Democracy, Communism, or anything like that but champions of the Human Race. It is not the Homeland that they feel called on to defend at any cost but the planet Earth as Home. If in the interests of making sure we don't blow ourselves off the map once and for all, we end up relinquishing a measure of national sovereignty to some international body, so much the worse for national sovereignty.

There is only one Sovereignty that matters ultimately, and it is of another sort altogether.
