Concordia and Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF)

Concordia has a loan from LCEF with a balance of \$182,000. These funds were used to build the church and to build the addition to the parsonage. In addition, 26 members have used LCEF as an investment and have \$290,000. on deposit in different investments.

LCEF has a rebate program for those congregations whose members maintain deposits with them. Since our congregation members' deposits are 100% or greater than our loan the congregation receives a 1% rebate on our loan every year or a refund of \$1,820.00.

Last month the church opened a congregation's account of \$30,000. with funds that have been designated for building. Since we have our loan covered with deposits \$10,000 was credited to Our Redeemer in Grand Forks, ND. This brings their deposits to over 50% of their loan so that they will get .5% refund.

Well-doing and Wellness



What is the Relationship Between Health and Balance? Actually, wholistic health refers to a process of wholeness that exists when there is balance among our different dimensions (physical, emotional, spiritual, social, vocational, an environmental). As Christians, we believe that balance is only possible when we base our life on Christ; the spiritual dimension of our real essence. In John 10:10 we read, "...I have come that they might have life, and have it to the full." It seems that often we try to create our own "full life" and find ourselves overcommitted, under-appreciated, fatigued, frustrated and out of balance. We need to find the "full life" and balance that only Christ can give.

Why Am I Out of Balance? There are many different reasons why we can feel out of balance. First, unfortunately, the human condition seems more aligned with chaos than balance. If this were not true, we would not need a Great Physician to bring balance, peace, and wholeness to our broken lives. Second, we live lives in which demands out-pace our time or energy. Some of these demands we place on ourselves, and some are imposed from the

outside. We spend our lives trying to "balance" roles related to the home (spousal & parenting); work place; church; friends and extended family; and community. Third, our culture seems to over-value service to others and under-values care of ourselves. Self-care may seem a luxury which few of us can afford, yet without it the "full life" remains out of our grasp. Fourth, we seem addicted to "quick fixes" and have little appetite for long-term solutions. Finding and keeping balance takes time and effort day by day.

What Life Principles Can Help Me Find & Keep My Balance? The Bible provides us with several principles which can be helpful in finding and keeping our balance. First, all we do should be done for the glory of God (I Cor. 10:31). This is really a primary objective of our lives as Christians, and following this principle can help keep our stressors in perspective. Second, God has created all of life. Jesus reminds us that rest (Sabbath) was made for man's benefit; rather than man being created for either work or observance of the Sabbath. Rest and work are equally important dimensions of our life (Mark 2:27). Third, we are encouraged to not be overly concerned about things which are temporary (Luke 12:22). Jesus reminds us that our Father will provide those things which are necessary for this life, and we are encouraged to set our minds on spiritual concerns.

How Can I Keep My Life in Balance? There are several specific approaches we can use to nourish this gift of balance. First, we can consider our current life in terms of energy

investment, values, and priorities. Are we "spending" our life in activities that have eternal consequences? Second, we can develop an action plan, if we would like to spend our energy and time in a different way. To be helpful, the plan would need to identify what needs to be changed, what it needs to change to, and how the change will be made. Third, we can live our changed lives with the confidence that "...He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus." (Philippians 1:6)

I encourage you to bring up this subject of balance with others in fellowship during the summer weeks. Let's share our thoughts, concerns and ideas with each other - listen to and encourage one another.

MARK

GET THE BIG PICTURE

"Is it lawful to love - even on the Sabbath Day?" At heart that's the question with which Mark 3 begins. Jesus answered it in His actions. These actions sparked a clash with the Pharisees and set in motion a series of events in which Jesus revealed the upsidedown way a servant looks at relationships, power, and the purpose of life. Be on the lookout for this as you read.

Read Mark 3-4. If time is short, focus on 3: 20-35.

SHARPEN THE FOCUS

God's wisdom is foolishness to human beings. St. Paul makes that fact clear in 1 Corinthians 1:18-30. It that's so, then Jesus *must have* seemed out of His mind (Mark 3:21). Never had anyone spoken and demonstrated the wisdom of God so thoroughly. So far-fetched did His servanthood and humility seem that His friends and family wanted to take Him into custody. His enemies even accused Him of being possessed by the devil.

How thoroughly has God's wisdom infiltrated your heart? When was the last time someone looked at your service for the Lord Jesus and said, "You're out of your mind"?

Jesus lived out a radical lifestyle - radical

meaning "from the root" or "getting to the root." He got beyond the showy foliage and down to the core of what it means to care for those whom the Father so loves (John 3:16). That route led Him to the most foolish, most radical act of all. This is how St. Paul puts it:

• We preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God.



A VISION OF THE FUTURE FOR CONCORDIA

- 1. Complete the established and ratified building program.
-Maximize the available space here on our present site.
-Be specific in regard to solving the parking issue in present site. If there is a need to trim part of the hill and add a retaining wall...so be it. If we need to fill part of the ditch along Concordia lane...so be it. Blacktopped and lined! Solve the problem.
-We need a larger fellowship area.
-We need better classroom and meeting space on this site.
-We need storage.
-We need to add worship overflow space...not a larger sanctuary.
-We need to be more sensitive to young families with better nursery space.
-Be prepared to use the new classroom space for Christian pre-school and day care.

We need to plan to maximize this particular location. At the same time we need to be planning a second congregation when we approach the "full" usage of this space. We do not need to build a bigger "Concordia" somewhere else. We need to think about a second congregation and preaching stations. Hayden/Clark/Oak Creek/Stagecoach.

- 2. Call a second pastor.
-A second pastor would serve part-time here at Concordia and work toward the development of a second congregation in the Oak Creek Stagecoach area.
-Part of the vision of the new "Mission" might be the development of a retreat setting for front range congregations as well as a facility for congregational use.
-We have nearly 20 households that are located south of the new Haymaker Golf Course. Oak Creek/Stagecoach have many unchurched families.
-District dollars \$\$\$ are perhaps available for such an effort.
- 3. Develop a new congregation in the Oak Creek/Stagecoach area.
-Find a site and purchase the site. (District Mission \$\$\$)
-Canvass the community and gather data.
-Commission the families south of the Haymaker to begin this effort.
-Rent a facility in that community to begin worship and mission efforts.
-The releasing of these families will make room here at Concordia.
-Retreat and Conference opportunities are truly wonderful.
-Train "Preaching" Elders for this task in its initial phases.

A Word from the DCE

Last January the congregation provided a position description for me as your Director of Christian Education. Among the tasks identified were: Assist & teach 50% of Jr. High Confirmation Classes; organize annual high school events; help organize & direct annual VBS programs; administer Jr. High Sponsor program; teach & administer Thurs. Women's Bible Study; help with and lead Thursday Recovery Group & Wed. Bible Study Group when needed; and organize & lead an annual Women's Retreat.

In addition, this summer I have also taken on coordinating and leading a summer "integrated age group" Sunday School - and helped with the annual Outdoor Worship.

Directors of Christian Ed (DCE's) in Lutheran Churches are a diversified branch. Some congregations have a DCE whose job is clearly music oriented, whereas some DCE's are trained only in youth ministry. Some are early Childhood Ed. specialists - and some prefer only Adult Ed. Many of you have asked what is my background and emphasis.

I started in 1973 serving as the LCMS's first youth staffer to the So. Illinois District. My job for a year was as a consultant to 80 congregations to revive & restore youth ministry. I led youth retreats & district conventions and worked with many churches on location to facilitate a healthy youth ministry. From there I was called to serve as a youth director at St. Johns Lutheran Church in Seward, NE where I worked with 250 youth from 1974-76. In 1977 I worked as a DCE intern at Chapel of the Cross—St. Louis Missouri, and finished my BA degree with

DCE Certification from Concordia College in Seward, NE in 1979.

My emphasis in college covered theology and social work as well as methods of education. During my first two years of college at St. John's Winfield I worked teaching "Special Ed" Bible Classes for all ages at a state hospital, and also served a January term as a youth counselor at the County Detention Center in St. Louis.

Because I enjoyed intergenerational work, I insisted that my college courses covered education & theology classes that would prepare me for working with all ages. My first DCE position was at Our Savior Lutheran, Minot, ND - a mission congregation where I led a yearround "VBS" program for 3-5 year olds called "King's Kid's" and taught a weekly Bible Study at a group home for "mentally & physically challenged" adults - as well leading a myriad of other congregational ed. programs. I also worked as a DCE at Trinity, Eden, ID where I concentrated on small group ministry (i.e. Bible Studies & the Recovery Group), organized & helped teach a mid-week program for 75 elementary kids on Wednesdays, co-led Marriage Strengthening events, administered VBS, participated in weekly senior citizens study luncheons, helped with Youth Ministry, and strongly supported women's ministries.

Growing up in a Midwest clergy family gave me the foundation of enjoying congregational life. Working with my husband has provided a richly stimulating team ministry. Having a Christ-centered marriage & homelife with 3 teenage daughters has added depth to my faith and humor to my life. Thank you for the opportunity to use my gifts to serve as your DCE.
