


Quilt sent the 'wrong way'



Healthy Faith

We know healthy faith when we see it: in the trust of a child who rests securely in the promise of parents and God; in the hope of a bedridden grandmother whose sense of selfworth and purpose in life have not been dimmed by the limitations that age and disease have placed on her; in the commitment of parents who bring their children to baptism and cultivate their identity as children of God; in the loving service of a hospice volunteer who brings the healing presence of Christ to persons who are dying.

I think all of us value spiritual health more than we do physical or mental health. But do we attend as much to spiritual wellness as physical wellness? Yes, we go to church and pray in time of need, But beyond that, are we conscious of our spiritual diet? Do we engage in spiritual exercise regularly through meditation, reading Scripture, sharing our faith with others and serving those in need?

What are some characteristics of healthy faith? This is my list. Make your own and add to it things that you can do to improve the spiritual health of yourself and your children.

Healthy faith, like a healthy body, is above all a gift from God. That's most obvious in infant baptism, God cleansing the child from sin and naming the child as His forever. Faith is all gift in baptism, God's doing and not ours. And though we exeperience faith as our action as well as God's gift as faith develops, the gift quality of

faith is always its most obvious characteristic.

I remember a "dark night of the soul" in my college years when I was deeply troubled with many doubts. At the time I felt guilty about experiencing what I know now was a stage in the development of a healthy faith. God was closer to me than I was to myself through that experience, and what I remember now is not the doubting but the faithful presence of God guarding my soul. Sheer grace. All gift.

Faith, like the self of which it is a part, develops by stages throughout life. The faith of a small child is different from the faith of a college student conflicted by doubt and the faith of a mature adult. What is most apparent in the faith of a child is trust, a struggle for meaning in the faith of a young adult, and a commitment to loving service in the faith of a mature adult. A healthy faith is a developing faith, even though changes from one state to the next can be disruptive and troubling.

Healthy faith grows stronger and deeper all the way to the end of life. Spiritual health is different from physical health in this respect. A healthy body reaches a peak of strength and vitality and then gradually diminishes through the aging process until death takes its toll. By contrast, a healthy faith becomes deeper and stronger as it matures.

Emma was a hospice patient dying of a rapidly growing cancer. I had the rare


privilege of witnessing the healthy dying of a woman who knew in the deepest part of herself that she was a child of God. Her body disintegrated. Her spirit soared. Her faith was grounded in eternal life, a gift that was already hers in baptism. Her faith was a bridge to life on the other side of the grave.

Healthy faith sustains us in periods of adversity. Adversity comes with many different faces: physical illness, the loss of a job, a broken relationship, severe depression over long periods of time, leaving home, moving to a different place, the death of a friend or member of the family. Faith gets tested in time of suffering, and a healthy faith keeps hope and trust in God's presence alive and strong.

My friendwhip with Bob goes back to the eartly years of our ministry. Both recent graduates of the seminary, we shared our joys and frustrations. Bob knew alredy then that his wife had a blood disease that was likely to end in a premature death. They raised a family and had a full life together, but her death was a wrenching loss. The contatas of J.S. Bach, so full of Christ dead and risen, sustained Bob in his grieving and made the difference between a lively hope and overwhelming despair.

Healthy faith needs nurture. Health is a gift from God, including spiritual health, but no gift should be taken for granted. The following rules for staying spiritually well come with no guaranteed of prolonging your life, but with the promise of strengthening your faith for now and for eternity.

◆ Spend some time each day alone with God.



- Plan a family gathering at least three times a week to nurture relationships with each other and God.
- Gather at least once a week around word and sacrament with other members of your community of faith.
- ◆ Make a personal commitment to set aside a minimum number of hours per week for serving others through your church or another community agency.

Rules are not healthful when they are used as an instrument to judge yourself and others, but a healthy faith calls for a disciplined spiritual life in the same way that a healthy body calls for a disciplined physical regiment of regular exercise, good diet and so forth. Faith is God's gift to us. Spiritual discipline is what we do with the gift, how we feed it and exercise it.

Good health to all - in body, mind and spirit!

Quiet Times for Parents by H. Norman Wright

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea...(Matthew 2:1)

Christmas each year weaves its magic spell upon our hearts. Carols float on the air and there is a surge of love and kindliness not felt at any other time of the year. Chreches appear reminding us of the miracle in the manger. In that feeding trough in lowly Bethlehem, a cry from that infant's throat broke the centuries of silence. For the first time God's voice could be heard coming from human vocal cords. C.S. Lewis called that event - the coming of Christ at Christmas - "the greatest rescue mission of history."

During each Christmas season the words of Micah resonate throughout the world. For he was inspired to give the prophecy that named the very birthplace of the Messiah: But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for Me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times (5:2).

Micah was telling those who were proud and powerful and rich and self-righteous that God's great ruler would not come from their stately and royal environs. He would come forth from the nondescript hamlet of Bethlehem. When over 700 years later the wise men came searching for Him, the scribes had to brush off the dust from the book of Micah to direct them to the very

location where He would be born.

The One who would come is One whose origins are from of old, from ancient times (verse 2). This literally means "from days of eternity." It speaks of the eternal existence of Christ. His providence and preeminence are also prophesied as one who will stand and shepherd His flock and His greatness will reach to the ends of the earth. And He will be their peace (verses 4-5). What beautiful and precious promises are ours from this plowman who became God's mighty penman.

THE ADVENT WREATH & CANDLES

- ◆ The first candle is the candle of PROPHESY. It reminds us of the many Biblical passages that point us to the coming (Advent) of Christ. It is the candle of LOVE.
- ◆ The second candle is the BETHLEHEM candle. It symbolizes the Savior's coming to earth as a child. It is the candle of PEACE.
- The third candle is the candle of the SHEPHERD. This candle signifies Jesus coming into our hearts by faith. This is the candle of JOY.
- The fourth candle is the ANGEL candle. This candle represents Jesus' second and final coming (advent). This is the candle of hope.
- The white candle is the CHRIST candle. White symbolizes PURITY.

The Advent colors are purple which indicates royalty, penance and repentance. Advent is a reflective time. The pink indicates Joy and celebration. These two colors are inseparable. They belong together.

The Advent Wreath is circular in fashion. The eternal nature of God is hinted at. Also, the cycle of the seasons are indicated. The wreath is made of evergreens indicating eternal life and growth.

Advent as a season of preparation for the Festival of the Nativity originated in France. Its observance was quite general by the time of the Council of Tours, 563. It was probably not until the thirteenth century that Advent was universally recognized as beginning the Christian year, which up to that time had begun with the Festival of the Annunciation in March or, in some places, with Christmas.

Reflecting on a threefold Advent - His Coming in the flesh, His return to Judgment, and His daily Coming - are a part of the spiritual preparation during the Advent season.


