

Greetings in the name of our Risen Lord!



"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven. . . . a time to search and a time to give up." (Ecclesiastes 3:1&16)

Have you ever stirred in the middle of the night? Have you ever broken a good night's sleep for no apparent reason? Have you ever slipped from beneath the nice comfort of a warm bed? Have you ever looked into a dark "mid' night sky and looked deep into the universe?

Whenever my night's rest is broken, and I find myself searching the heavens and my soul, it often is a time that I reflect upon the "bigness" of God and the "smallness" of man.

10 WAYS TO A HEALTHY SELF-IMAGE by Michele Hatty

TEENS:

- 1. Find a mentor. Ask an adult you admire to meet every other week to chat. You'll gain from his or her wisdom and have someone to turn to with problems.
- 2. Manners matter so get some. You'll be more comfortable in social situations. Examples: Invited to a party? Offer to bring something. Afterward? Send a thank-you note. Check out *Social Savvy*, by Judith Re.
- 3. Learn how to fend for yourself. Can you change a tire? Do laundry without turning everything gray? By learning skills, you'll feel empowered to tackle everyday challenges.
- 4. Volunteer. You'll not only feel good about helping others, but you'll also get a bigger picture of the world around you and be reminded of how good you have it.
- 5. Explore your talents. Try a variety of activities, such as choir, the student newspaper or a new sport. Finding a hobby you enjoy or unearthing a new talent will boost your self-identity and help you make friends with similar interests.
- **6. Be media-savvy.** Forget gushy teen mags. Try *JUMP*, which focuses on fitness and self-assurance, or *blue jean magazine*, an issues-oriented mag written and produced by girls, for girls.

PARENTS:

- 1. Teach teens to cook. Nearly half of American teens say they shop for groceries and cook for their family each week, a new study shows. That's good news for parents and not just because they need help. Teens should be in charge of making dinner once a week because they'll learn a vital skill, feel they have accomplished something and appreciate the "official" family cook even more.
- 2. Hang out with your teen's friends. Mother-daughter book clubs have sprung up, and for good reason: Spending time with teens and their friends while getting to know other parents will help build positive relationships. Dads, plan a monthly "Men's Night Out" for fathers and sons. And make sure your teens know their friends are always welcome at your house.
- 3. Take a walk in the dark with your teenager. You're more likely to have a great conversation in a situation that allows the teen to avoid eye contact.
- 4. Learn from the experts. Daughters, a newsletter out of Nashville, is rich with advice for talking with, learning from and caring for girls 8 to 18. Recent articles have touched on boy obsessions, sibling squabbles and friendships. Even better: It includes further resources (\$25.00 for eight issues; 1-800-829-1088). In June, look for A Fine Young Man by psychotherapist and educator Michael Gurian (\$24.95, Tarcher/Putnam).

We here at Concordia believe it is essential to encourage caring marriages and strong families built on the foundation of Christ. To that end, we have a partial list of ideas compiled to lend itself to some creative ways of sharing the faith at home.

- Let the whole family do a special servant event, helping with the church rummage sale, church work day, ECC service or other service projects.
- Have a family memory night, review photo albums together and thank God for special memories. (Build new memories: the world's largest banana split, family camp out in the living room, and a moonlight walk at midnight, etc.)
- Have a MOM is MARVELOUS NIGHT..
 each member does something special for mom each day of the week.
- ◆ Have a SUPER DAD NIGHT...
- Every once in a while play a Christian game after a meal (101 Bible word searches, Bible Pictionary, Bible Trivia, Life Stories, etc.,) and give prizes to all.
- Talk about taking care of God's creation, have a trash pick up in the neighborhood one evening as you walk and talk.
- Read Bible verses about the joy of giving and then give flowers etc. to special friends and neighbors.
- Pray each niught before bedtime together keep a prayer journal.
- Have individual time together with each child once a month at a restaurant or favorite place to listen to his/her concerns and joys.

- Declare a quiet day in your life once a week/month (no TV, no meetings, etc.) and use it to reflect on God's word, to refresh your prayer life, and renew your resolve to live as God's forgiven child.
- Use one month to make a thank list, add to it each night and see how long it is by the end of the month. Post it on a door or refridgerator.
- Pick family or congregation family members to pray for. Pray for that one person for a whole week.






