Vacations are spent returning to places familiar. Children come home for summer vacation from college studies. Adult children return to the place where they grew up in order to visit familiar family and friends. Wedding locations are visited. Cemeteries are frequented. Vacation spots are often returned to over and over again.

A savvy, Jewish tourism minister recognizes the financial windfall of reopening the "supposed" baptismal site of our Lord in the Jordan. This same savvy Israeli is smart enough to capitalize on the foolish "year 2,000" craze that is presently choking much of the mind of America. There is money to be made by opening this site again.

Returning to the site of baptism is a wonderful idea. However, let me encourage you not to waste your money and head to the banks of the Jordan. Rather, head to the font. . . . the baptismal font. For there you were joined to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.



Our baptism is not a one time snapshot. Our baptism is a lifelong video. For in the waters of baptism our whole life was baptized. Our whole being was joined to the life, death and resurrection of Christ. It wasn't just a fleeting moment of forgiveness granted at the font. It was a lifetime, an overflowing eternity of forgiveness, that was granted.

When you see a baptism take place here at Concordia be reminded that God may be inviting you to "return home" to the place of your new birth. It reminds me of our Pathways theme, "BEHOLD, GRACE OVERFLOWING!"

Building Assets

he Jump-Start program used in the Kennebunk area of Maine is rooted in the asset-building approach of Minneapolisbased Search Institute. Search has identified 40 assets desirable for young people. The more assets a young person has, the less likely the youngster will be involved in risky behavior.

Here's how the Jump-Start program helps build some of the assets identified by Search Institute.

Family Support: Jump-Start involves parents with an overview of the program and a session designated as parent night. Parents are given a chance to learn conflict resolution and parenting skills.

Other adult relationships: Each student is teamed with a mentor.

Caring school climate: Youth are encouraged to talk about school experiences and to use problem-solving techniques in school.

Community values youth: One session is dedicated to meeting with adults from the community.

Community service to others: Community service is required, and students are encouraged to become more involved in their community.

"Encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing." (1 Thessalonians 5:11).

Family boundaries: Youths participating in Jump-Start must abide by a set of rules or face consequences for disobeying.



Adult role models: Mentors and community panelists participating in the program are from varied backgrounds, providing a wide array of role models for students.

Positive peer influence: Students listen to each others' goals, dreams and

aspirations and are tught to respect each other. Students also provide positive reinforcement to each other.

Creative activities: Music has proved to be an excellent learning tool. The music and lyrics are analyzed so that situations, goals and decisions are pinpointed. Poems, short stores and other literature are used as well.

Time at home: Participants' outside activities are limited, resulting in more time spent with parents.

Achievement motivation: Students are motivated through the setting of shortrange, mid-range and longrange goals.

School encouragement: Students sign a contract while in the program agreeing to stay in school and maintain their grades.

Responsibility: Student are required to write letters of apology, make restitution, observe curfews and participate in counseling.

Planning and decisionmaking: Mentors help students use the decisionmaking skills they're learning.

Love That Knows No Limits

certain minister regularly called at the farm home of one of his church members and her husband, who was not a believer in Christ. For some time the minister had been looking for an opportunity to teach the unbelieving farmer about the depth of Christ's love for him. One day that opportunity arrived.

The farmer greeted the minister as he got out of his car, saying, "I'd like to show you something in the chicken house." With that the two men headed for the coop. As they entered it, the farmer pointed to a hen sitting with her brood of little chicks peeping out

from under her wings.

"Touch her," the farmer said as he motioned to the minister. When the minister did, he noticed that the hen was stiff and cold. She had been dead for hours. "Look at the wound in her head," said

the farmer. "During the night a weasel came and drained her body of every drop of blood in it, but she never moved from that spot in her nest. She died protecting her little ones from harm." With that the minister saw his opportunity. As they walked back to the farmhouse, he began to use the incident the two had just witnessed to teach the farmer about the depth of Christ's love for his little ones - all of lost humanity - including him.

As the hen loved her chicks so much that she willingly died on her nest to protect them from the weasel, the minister told that farmer how Christ loved him so much that he willingly died on the cross to rescue him from his sins, eternal death, and the power of the devil.

The hen could have left her nest and saved her life, but her love wouldn't allow it. At any moment on that first Good Friday, Jesus could have stepped down from his cross to save his life, but his love for our souls wouldn't allow it. He knew that beneath his outstretched arms were billions upon billions of souls for whom he had purposefully come to die because he loved them all. For all of them he died, that all of them might be forgiven and saved through believing in him.

Thank God that *all* includes you and me.

wenty five years ago this summer I started my journey into professional church work, as a consultant for youth ministry in 80 congregations in Southern Illinois. During those years and the years since then, Vacation Bible School has always been an exhilirating experience, but never more than this year!

Concordia has always been known for its great VBS programs with great crafts, recreation, Captive Free or Marketplace AD. This year we created our own VBS based on the theme *SHINE JESUS SHINE*. It was a team effort of more than 100 people.

The main focus of the VBS was the Easter Story. Other stories, like Jesus calming the storm and action stories from the New Testament emphasized the importance of living Easter Joy and Courage.

Team players included Pastor Tim who illustrated the stories with lifesize stage props and drama with children of all ages. Music leaders Rebecca Duryea and Tim Cartwright led the kids with upbeat Jazz. The kids sang with all their hearts and smiles (note the pictures on the bulletin boards downstairs and in the Narthex). Art projects were sensational this year with 100 prayer pillows. cross necklaces, Photo-Easter cards, home job charts, etc. directed by Ellyn Myller, Donna Starbucks, and Pam Patterson.

Suppers were delicious and very

kid oriented planned by Judy Plumb and her excellent staff. Recreation was absolutely wonderful especially considering the rain! Special thanks to Pam Parker and her high school assistants: Kia Cartwright, Suzanne Zimmerer and Travis Wolf. Thirty additional staff worked with the kids as teachers and assistants.

The highlight of the week were the 100 Courage Kits (totebags) made with fabric donated by LeeAnnPifer from MATERIAL GIRLS fabric store in Steamboat. Twenty women met for two weeks to cut and sew the bags. The high school kids had an overnight at the church Saturday night stuffing the totebags with flashlights, frisbees, crayons, coloring books, candy, pencils, paper and toiletries. Then the kids colored "courage cards" including 15 Spanish ones, adding their

prayers for courage and blessing to each kit. The kits will be given to children at Children's Hospital and Lutheran Hospital in Denver, and to children at our Routt County hospital.

Money offerings from VBS were donated to the new hospital chapel to be built, and food donations were given to Lift-Up. I am very proud of these youngsters who have so much FUN giving. Including these Vacation Bible School kids, we have had over 150 young people participating in community service through the church in projects like Habitat for Humanity, Lutheran World Hun ger and Disaster Relief, Special Olympics, Extended Care Center, Children's Hospital, and Lift-Up food shelter.

It is a privilege to work in such a wonderful church with such terrific people and such a Great God! Behold, Grace Overflowing.



In moments of uncertainty, when we ask whether anything that's been around so long can still be effective, I see the face of a preschool child at worship, face smiling and eyes aglow. "Jesus loves me, this I know for the Bible tells me so," the child sings. Someone taught that child about the Savior, probably in Sunday School.

Here lies the point of it allteaching the faith. "How can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard?" (Romans 10:14). The task of teaching the faith remains a high calling.

God grants grace to teachers in each time and place to pass on His story to the next generation. The process continues today and will continue into the next century. As we remember Jesus' promise to be with us always, the Sunday school may have one or two more good centuries left in it after all.

The Youth Gathering is going to be the largest in church history with 30,000 students and counselors! Now is the time for us to say thank you for all your support








Hidden Books of the Bible


