

ear Walt, How can I get faith?

Dear friend, this is how I answer you. With a parable.

When I was a kid in the second grade, I roared it all over the neighborhood, how strong were the arms of my father. I knew my Dad, had watched him chopping wood and declared his strength superior to Jimmy's Dad for sure. But I didn't believe it. Not with my life.

In our backyard stood a cherry tree. Ten feet up a stout branch forked northward. Upon that fork I would lay me down - my "private place" where I went to be alone, to dream, to read, to bathe myself in the higher air of self-importance.



Now it happened on a summer's day that a thunderstorm caught me in my kingdom unaware. Suddenly the east wind assailed my tree, and tore the book from my hands, and made a small boy throw his arms around the forking

branches for dear life, his head slung down between them.

"Dad! Dad!" I shrieked, and the rain swept up and whipped me. A low cloud cracked and blackened the earth. "Dad!"


My father appeared at the back door. For just an instant I giggled in the wind, relieved. "Hurry!" I cried. If I broke his sticklike arms I would hit the ground and then what? Then I'd die. Forget your jumping! I gripped the branches with my arms tighter than ever.



Parents and adolescents work very hard at "hating it - but doing it anyway." This applies to hon est interpersonal confrontation, keeping commitments and avoiding certain very attractive temptations.


The History of Sanctuary Paraments

from the First Congregational Church, Manchester, VT

The use of color in worship began in the ninth century. At first, the newest or most magnificent vestments and paraments were used on great festival days, irrespective of color, in much the same way we like to 'dress up' at Easter or Christmas.

In 1570 an accepted pattern of color was formally defined in the reformed missal under Pope Pious V. The churches of the Reformation rejected the use of color in worship at the time. Where the Calvinist or puritan spirit prevailed, clergy wore plain black gowns.

Liturgical color came into renewed use in the Church of England in the mid-nineteenth century and spread to other Protestant churches. Today many churches use the traditional



liturgical colors at specific times to help express the mood and meaning of the various seasons in the church year. It is natural to associate red with blood, passion, fire and Pentecost; violet with dignity, majesty, Advent and Lent; white with celebration, purity, Christmas and Easter; and green with growth and renewal.




