

# Heart-to-Heart Talks by Tom Couser

e were seated at the table for our traditional Thanksgiving Day meal. It is our custom to individually pray for things we are thankful for. Daughter Katie had added a twist. She randomly assigned us other members of the family to pray for. Fourteen-year-old Mark had my name. "I am thankful that Dad likes his new job working for the district," Mark prayed. "He needs to be happy."

Inwardly I smiled. My kids, at least Mark anyway, had gotten the message. My new job had caused me to be away from home about a third of the time. That was difficult. But the reality was, after years of feeling like my talents were not being properly used, I felt fulfilled. I had tried hard to communicate that to our children.

That was not always the case for me, and I sense for many other parents. Our anger, frustration, grief or other feelings can be hidden from the members of our own family, especially our children. We don't want to burden them or, worse yet, see our vulnerability. The end result is that they only can judge us by our actions. They only see the results and often don't have a clue as to the why. We hide our souls from them. In the end they might even blame themselves for our unhappiness.

# Sharing Helps Them Understand

A parent who shares what's going

on inside helps those around them to comprehend the "why" behind the actions. It might be as simple as, "I'm fighting a cold so I might seem more irritable than usual."

If things aren't going well at the office, they need to be

aware of that. They don't need all the details but they do need to be aware that the source of the frustration is outside, rather than inside, the home.

# **Sharing Allows them to Support**

By sharing our soul we are giving them permission to support us in our struggles. My son Mark's prayer was an example. We had talked about my disappointments, now he was affirming my happiness. Sharing feelings allows them to provide us with the words of encouragement, the prayers and the extra hugs needed to get through the difficult times in life.

#### The Model of Sharing

By sharing our soul we are giving them permission to share their feelings too. If it's okay for mom and dad to feel disappointment and hurt, it must be okay for me. We can help them with that by letting them know that we care and by providing a listening ear when it's appropriate.

#### Feelings Are A Gift

Lastly, when feelings are shared, we are acknowledging them as a gift from God. Feelings are part of our human nature. Jesus modeled that during his earthly pilgrimage. At Lazarus' wake, he didn't excuse himself so he could have a "good cry". Publicly, "Jesus wept." When faced with the hypocrisy of the religious leaders, Jesus didn't veil his anger. He expressed it and always let those around him know the source.

If feelings are a gift from God, then they must be okay. Even anger is good - it's what we do with it that makes it bad.

God has made us to be sensitive and loving creatures. Our feelings and emotions are part of our soul. That needs to be communicated to those around us, especially our children.

Share your feelings. Join a support group or keep a personal journal. These are two ways you can uncritically give and receive love and acceptance.

Learn how to forgive. Carrying a grudge? Make a point to drop it. Forgiving others doesn't excuse their behavior, but it frees

you from the negative effects of anger on yourself.

Help others. Doing volunteer work or just lending a helping hand is a powerful tonic for isolation and loneliness.

Develop your spiritual life. Whether you go back to the religion of your childhood or follow another spiritual path, believing in a power greater than yourself

allows you to feel part of a larger community.

Touch. Whether it's a pat on the back or a stroke on the cheek, touching someone with respect establishes a free flow of intimacy.

Make a commitment. Commitment to another gives you a safe zone in which you can be vulnerable. And that makes greater intimacy possible.

# SIDE by SIDE: SERVING THE WORLD FOR JESUS

s one of Youth Encounter's newest ministries, SIDE by SIDE: Global Work Crews celebrates it's fourth summer in 1998. SIDE by SIDE provides an opportunity for people from the United States to dedicate one month of their summer to service and relational ministry in another country. The focus of a Work Crew centers on building relationships and sharing Christ with one another with a service project serving as the catalyst for bringing groups from different parts of the world together. The Crews serve the Lord and their fellow Christians through worshipping and working together, learning about different cultures, and building friendships overseas.

The Americans and foreign nationals work together on service projects coordinated by the hosting community. These projects vary tremendously both in type and intensity depending on the location. Last

summer the Crew to India helped paint apartments and plant fruit-bearing trees as an economic means for a Christian College while the Bolivian Crew painted a youth center

and provided some construction on a church and the Tanzanian Crew dug a new church foundation. Katie Cartwright (Bolivia Crew) recalls, "The work projects we ended up doing were a little different that what was described, but that was part of the experience. We learned how to be flexible and to do what was needed."

While it was exciting to see the impact of the service projects, Crew members agree that the people made the experience and ministry most meaningful. Jennifer Allen (Ecuador Crew) tells, "This trip really helped me grow in faith because I saw people who

didn't speak my language or know me for very long open their lives to me. The people told me how much they loved me and that I always had friends in Ecuador." This common theme of generosity prevailed throughout all of the countries visited. "They treated us like we were Jesus visiting their homes. It was incredible to see how one common thread, Christianity, can bring people so culturally different together" recalls Heather Shelsta (Tanzania Crew). The relationships made and the service project really go hand in hand.

Youth Encounter welcomes youth and adults at least fifteen years old or having completed 9th grade to join this incredible ministry experience of SIDE by SIDE. This summer's ministry sites included India, Latvia, Puerto Rico, and Tanzania.
