

Tenants, Tidbits and Trails ... the elder's report

Teen Drug Use Remains Level

Results of "Monitoring the Future," the annual survey of American youth, released in mid-December, show that the overall level of drig use by American teen-agers was unchanged in 1998. The survey, conducted annually since 1975, asked 50,000 American teens at 422 schools a variety of questions about drug use.

The results of the report paint a mildly optimistic picture. While the use of drugs by high school senios was unchanged from last year, the number of 10th graders who said that they had used drugs in the last year dropped from 38.5% last year to 35% this year. Among 8th graders, drug use was also down slightly, from 23.6% to 21%.

Marijuana remains the most popular drug (excluding alcohol) among high school students. Forty percent of 10th graders said that they had

Teen Troubleshooters

Have teenagers troubleshoot typical family aggravations? What a concept! But that's just what Joe Quattrini, an English teacher in New York, commissioned a fellow teacher's health class to do. Here are some typical aggravations and strategies kids came up with:

Aggravation: Kids fighting over what to watch on TV. Solution: Each week, kids reserve shows by writing their names next to them on the TV schedule.

Aggravation: Kids hogging the telephone. Solution: Set a timer for 20 minutes when someone makes or receives a call.

Aggravation: Fighting over who rides in the front seat. Solution: Have kids choose either odd or even numbered days of the month and sit in front on their days.

Tuesday Bible Study: Meet and study the Word of God prior to work. This study begins at 6:30am and is done promptly at 7:30am. The format is one of discussion and reflection on God's Word. A good cup of coffee or tea is ready for you upon arrival. Give this study a try!

Study:

Churchgoers Live Longer!

A major study of church attendance and mortality reveals people who attend church weekly live an average of seven years longer than people who never attend worship services.

That seven-year gap is the same as the difference in life expectancies between men and women and between blacks and whites. Among black people studied, the gulf was even wider, with the life expectancy at age 20 for those who regularly attend church being 60.1 more years (that is, living to age 80), compared with 46.4 more years (age 66) for those who never attend church.

The findings by sociologists Robert A. Hummer of the Population Research Center at the University of Texas at Austin, Christopher G. Ellison of the University of Texas, Richard G. Rogers of the University of Colorado at Boulder and Charles B Nam of Florida State University were presented at the joint meeting of the Religious Research Association and the Society for the Scientific Study of Religion.

Several previous studies have uncovered a positive link between religion and physical and mental health. However, there has been little research on the national level into the relationship between religious experience and mortality.
