

A Note From the Pastor. . .

TO THE MEMBERS AND FRIENDS OF CONCORDIA,

GREETINGS IN THE NAME OF THE RISEN CHRIST!

I have a sister living in the Salt Lake City area. She does not belong to the Christian faith. She prays. She worships. She lives a good life. She also claims that miracles are a regular part of her life. Her daughter participates in a local city drama group. Opening night came for the production. The lead female actress was strickened with acute appendicitis. My sisters' daughter was the best friend of the soon to be "fill-in" actress. A leader from the church came and prayed prior to the performance. As a result of

that prayer and blessing, a flawless performance resulted. All rejoiced and thanked god. "It was a miracle," she said. "This demonstrates that our god is 'the' god."

"It is my firm belief that we are unaware of all the miracles that go on around us each day".

Islam claims miracles in the name of their god. Israel claims that the "Six-Day" war was a miracle of their god. Christians as well as non-Christians (and there are but two categories) experience miracle after miracle. Each religious system claims their own god as the reason that miracles occur. It even gets so

ridiculous that people claim that it is their "faith" in their gods that bring about miracles. People often sound as if they control their god by their faith. One could say that if you twist your god's arm enough "it" will give you a miracle.

Consider, if you will, the miracles that apparently do not happen. Two Christians leave for separate vacations. Both pray specifically for a safe journey. Both are active and alive Christians. One enjoys a safe trip. The other is killed in a freeway accident seven miles from home. One claims a miracle, the other is no longer claiming a thing. Why didn't God give two miracles?

It is my firm belief that we are unaware of all the miracles that go on around us each day. We are unable to live, breath and have our being without miracles. These are the hidden variety. Consider the beat of the heart. Consider the rising sun. Consider the conception of a child. Consider the spotted fawn laying silent on the forest floor. Consider life!

The hidden miracles and the "apparently" missing miracles that did not happen, as well as the miracles of other gods, make me ask some serious in general. They make me wonder about the miracles of our Lord.

Jesus' miracles were to demonstrate his love for fallen mankind. They demonstrated his "Diety", his "Godness." Jesus fed the hungry because of his love. Jesus healed the sick because of love and the need to demonstrate that he was God. Jesus calmed the storm because he was

demonstrating his power.



Jesus' greatest miracle was to march up the rocky Calvary road. It was there he was spit upon, spiked, thorned, fisted, beat, speared, mocked and died. Jesus, as miraculous as it sounds, became sin! That was the greatest miracle . . . except one. The lresurrection!

"God give them Grace to live unafraid.


Give them strength to stand tall, when others would bring them down.

Too Much TV!!

"What's the top-rated TV show for 2- to 5-year-olds?" asks David Walsh, author of Selling Out America's Children and president of the National Institute on Media and the Family. Well, it's not Barney or Sesame Street as you might expect but the adult sitcom Friends.

Given the fact that American children spend an average of 25 hours a week watching television and that some of the programs they watch contain sexually suggestive situations rather than innocuous furry animals, it's no wonder Walsh contends that Americans "vastly underestimate the influence of this powerful tool."

"Media influence is one of the most critical issues facing Christians today," says Walsh, a Roman Catholic and father of three. "TV is a powerful values educator, but the values it puts forth are frequently not the gospelbased values churches are trying to instill. In fact, in some instances they are directly opposed to those values.

The good news, he says, is the growing awareness of television's influence among members of religious organizations. And according to this psychologist, who spends a quarter of his time speaking to groups nationwide, "the denomination responding most strongly to this issue is the Lutheran church." Walsh spoke most recently to people attending a communitybuilding workshop at Minneapolis' Holy Trinity Lutheran Church.

Here are a few TV control tips:

Remove televisions from childrens bedrooms.

Almost 60% of school-age kids have televisions in their bedrooms, Walsh says.
Confine television to family spaces so parents can more easily monitor kids' use.

Set up ground rules.

Establish and enforce TV guidelines for amount and content allowed. Walsh suggests that children under 3 watch no more than three

hours per week and those older than 3, no more than 90 minutes per day.

Ban television during mealtimes. Two-thirds of families have the set on during at least one meal a day, Walsh says, thereby undercutting one of the few occasions they share as a family.

Look at your own TV use.

"The example we set is more powerful than any preaching we do." he says.

TIME FOR PRACTICE ...







hink of how much time your family spends practicing for something. Perhaps you started with a wedding rehearsal. Then Lamaze classes as you practiced for births. Then you are on a roll: ball practice, piano practice, school program practice, graduation practice and soon you'll be back where you started with a wedding rehearsal.

May I suggest one more practice session for your family?

As your family gets ready for church, remind everyone that going to church is practice for the rest of the week.

The worship gets going with "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." That's saying, "Good morning, God." We know who God is, and he knows who we are; so we say "Hi!" to him. For the next six days, members of the family will know they should say, "Good morning" to each other. Too often people treat family members like snakes with infectious diseases and save smiles and cheery "Good mornings" for the bus driver or strangers on the street. Christian worship gets you into the habit of knowing how to greet someone you love.

Next you get a chance to confess your sins. Family members should sit together to

check on each other for this one. Do you hear your spouse, children, parents, siblings, admit they are sinners - right out in front of God and everybody? Practice that one till you get it right. If you can do it in church, you will be able to do it at home after you brought home a bad attitude that infected the whole family. If you listen to the other sinners in your family come clean during worship, you'll be able to get the message when they mumble their "I'm sorrys" at home or show it by doing something nice for you.

Then comes the part about being forgiven. When you hear the message of forgiveness, imagine Jesus on the cross and hear Him say, "Trust me on this one." Then remember that He forgives the others in your family by the same illogical love. Trust Him on that one. Practice believing that what was the whole damned family is now the whole forgiven family.


In the worship service you learn how to praise God just because he is God. He may not do everything the way you want him to, but he loves you and knows what is best, so you can be glad that he is your God. You've got to translate this idea when you take it home because the members of your family aren't perfect like God. I mean they can't even come close, but they are the best you've got; so make the best of it

- and hope they do the same for you. Learn how to praise them for being who they are and help them live up to the praise they get.

In the worship service you learn how to say, "thank you," how to ask for help for yourself and others. You learn how to give. (Dig into your own pocket when the plate comes by.) When you worship, you learn how to listen and to learn. You learn to think about others because some of the music or something else they do may not be your thing, but you can learn to enjoy someone else enjoying what doesn't ring your bell.

Finally, learn how to let God bless you so you can let others bless you too and so you too can give a blessing when it's needed.






LWML News . . .
