## News from the DCE - Marlys Cartwright

On October 24 the Epistle lesson is hung like a crushing weight in her 1 Thessalonians 2:1-8, "So deeply chest. do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the Gospel of God but also our own selves."

A story from "Word of Life," one of our new library resources, documents a story about a nursing home resident named Helen. As you read this think about these questions: Who has loved you, so that you felt your faith being nurtured? What strengthens us to love our neighbors as ourselves? I you were completely convinced that God actually loves others through you, how would it change your behavior this week?

Helen debated what to wear to breakfast, though she sensed the impatience of the aid at her side, the one who got her out of bed and dressed her every morn ing. In the dining room no one greeted her. Medicine failed to relieve her aching back. Feeling confined by her wheelchair, she brooded, "I'm sick, I'm crippled, I'm all used up. God, what am I still doing here?!"

God loved her. Helen knew that. But today that knowledge didn't help much. Overhearing her roommate laugh and embrace her daughter and grandson. Helen felt horrible. Resentful. She ached for laughter and hugs with loved ones now beyond reach... especially her late husband. Helen's longing for him

After Bob died, Helen kept busy. Someone at church or in the neighborhood always needed a hand, and Helen was pleased to offer both of hers. Her friends and neighbors cherished her for her casseroles and encouraging notes. For years her pocket hankies dried the tears of neighborhood children and sometimes their mothers.

After a silent lunch, Helen wheeled herself towards her room. On the way she noticed Myrtle in her wheelchair. Myrtle's face looked pale and drawn, as if she were in severe pain. Helen asked if vour love. Bless our church, Conshe needed a nurse. Myrtle shook her head. Tears escaped down her wrinkled cheeks as she struggled to speak about the recent death of her sister. At first Helen listened only because it would have been rude to leave. But as Myrtle spoke of the memories and love she shared with her sister, a feeling of kinship stirred within Helen, followed by something more: the sensation of compassion. Absorbed in Myrtle's story, Helen hardly noticed the heaviness in her chest subside, and she completely forgot about her aching back. Once more she pulled rell, Jean Smith, Mary Beth Bradthe hanky from her pocket. She spoke simply, "Your sister and my Bob - I just know the Lord's holding them both. But they're in one hand and you and me, we're still in the Lord's other hand, and it sure feels like we're a long ways apart.

But since the same Lord is holding

us all, we'll come out right in the end. You:ll see.

Then, as if the antiseptic hallway had become sacred space, the women grew still. Slowly they began wheeling to their separate rooms when, on impulse, Helen murmured, "Supper tonight?" Glancing shyly over her shoulder, Myrtle replied, "Save me a place."

Inspire us, O God, to love one another more fully. Tune our hearts to sense the impulse of your love. Give us the courage to act, the grace to risk mistakes, and the pleasure of feeling alive through cordia, as we seek to love each other as you have loved us. Amen

### A WORD FROM OUR PARISH ADMINISTRATOR ...

"Be still, and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

It seems that I have been on a mission to reclaim my days of Sabbath. In the last few years my life has taken up a hectic and consuming pace. have probably 4 or 5 books now "cluttering" my shelves on how to "simplify" and "unclutter" my life. Perhaps many of you are in the same boat. Where is the breathing room? I have tried to be more intentional about what the priorities are in my life. What is of the deepest importance to me? My spiritual life has certainly moved into the forefront and I am trying to learn 'to be still' and to recognize that God often comes to me in a whisper. in the quiet.

"The Gift of the Retreat Center" by Daehler talks about the importance of rest, renewal, and the spirit of hospitality in our lives. Part of my work, I hope, is to nurture the spirit of hospitality in our congregation and to encourage the strengthening of bonds between our family of faith and those that are new to Concordia. How is our church doing in the area of hospitality? Jesus Christ practiced hospitality when he was hope in a good and gracious willing to meet people where they were at in their life journeys- in their sorrow, their chaos, their confusion etc., and He offered His presence in a spirit of friendship. He did not meet them with an immediate agenda to convert but to prepare the soil of friendship so that the seeds of the good news of God's mercy, love and grace would be able to grow strong in their lives. He listened and He shared the hope of the Gospel.



A retreat center may not be practical for many of us. However, I have come to look at my worship life as a retreat. I find it very renewing to gather together on a Sunday and center my life on what is most important and of greatest value to me. It is in this worship setting that we can share this gift of hospitality with our family of faith and others. By hearing the familiar rhythm of confession and absolution, affirmations of faith and benedictions I am able to renew a

sense of purpose in my life and God. Let us welcome people into our church as they are, and share with them what is of greatest value to us – a Savior, who gives us new life.

On Sundays I am able to retreat from the press of a culture which stresses selfsufficiency and advance in a spiritual life which affirms that God is indeed with us - that one does not live bereft of God's active presence. In the sacraments God comes to us with mercy and forgiveness. At the communion table God becomes tangible in our world. In our baptisms water and word affirm a sure promise of God's continual working in our lives. Be active in your worship life. As you start another week be encouraged by the words: "The Lord bless you and keep you. The Lord make His face shine on you and be gracious to you. The Lord look upon you with favor and give you peace."


Let us pray for one another, whatever our position in the church or station in life may be, that all our acts be centered on the Lord Jesus Christ.

#### The Gift of the Retreat Center

vears amidst the hills and dairy farms of northwestern Illinois, my family frequently went on Sunday afternoon drives. Usually my folks managed to make a drop-in visit somewhere along the way when we happened past the home of someone my parents knew.

So natural did such unscheduled visits seem that not once did I imagine they might be an imposition on the differently. people we visited. Instead, our visits were welcomed as a favor and flavored with conversation, coffee and cookies. Those we visited were practiced in the art of welcoming the unannounced visitor.

It was many, many years later, in a mud-dung nas of Tanzania's South Massailand, when I recognized the substance of those childhood Sunday visits. As a grandmotherly Massai woman poured boiled milk in my enamel cup and then prayed over her simple offering, I realized that those people my parents dropped in on were engaged in a most remarkable spiritual practice - hospitality.

When I thought of spiritual practices, I had

thought only of prayer, of Scripture During my childhood | reading, of meditation, of weekly worship. That hospitality might also be a spiritual practice did not occur to me. I made that oversight despite my familiarity with Jesus' own constant practice of hospitality - toward a Samaritan woman at Jacob's well and a tax collector in Jericho, toward sinners and social outcasts, toward lame and lepers, toward children and women. But I misunderstood His hospitality and presumed it had to do ence. Zaccheus was a classic examwith a mission conversion, that Jesus ple. had an "agenda" behind what he did. I have come to see Jesus' hospitality

> Everyone needs places and spaces for hospitable welcome.

It was Henri Nouwen, in his urgent schedule. book Reaching Out, who changed my understanding of Jesus' hospitality as creation of free space for people, not with intent to change them dwelling on the remote savan- but safe space in which change might take place. In other words, when hospitality is practiced well, it is free of expectations of the guest. empty of an agenda for his or her "own good," uncluttered by a web of the cup of coffee or wine, the bread opinions about what this person "really needs."

> This means that at the heart | God can do in them. of hospitality is the difficult but necessary discipline of self-emptying in character with Jesus' own selfemptying, about which Paul writes in Philippians: "Not counting equality with God something to be grasped,

(Jesus) emptied himself..." This self-emptying was at the heart of Jesus' ministry and was evident in His receptiveness to all kinds of people. He welcomed others without high and holy expectations or hidden agendas. In this free space Jesus created the ideal circumstances for God's transforming power to be at work with the consequence that people often experienced transformation in Jesus' pres-

In her book Practicing Our Faith, Dorothy Bass observes that there is a crisis of hospitality in our society. The sheer pressure of our busyness crowds hospitality out of our lives. For hospitality takes time and cannot be hurried to fit an

This is the gift of a retreat center. Retreat centers are places where hospitality is a practiced exercise. They are places along the road of life where one can enter and be welcomed "as you are" without notions of how you ought to be. They offer conversation or silence, of life. In these places, in these free and open spaces, guests are often amazed at the transforming work
