Words of Easter Encouragement from the DCE - Marlys

In a few weeks, Kia and some of her classmates will be flying to New York City for a school trip. Entering New York from the East side, after landing at LaGuardia Airport, they will see the magnificent New York skyline, stone piled on top of stone. From the shuttle they will see the Empire State Building, the World Trade Center, The Wall Street Complex, and Central Park penthouses. The city is one of the most awesome human complexes of power and energy, creativity and industry, on the face of the earth.



Suddenly, as the taxi turns the next curve, the skyline is replaced with a different pile of stones - what must be one of the world's largest cemeteries. Author, Dennis Anderson writes, "I'll never forget the first time I saw that contrast between the hopes and visions and power of man, in the skyline of the greatest city on earth - and what

looks like the world's largest collection of gravestones. What a contrast!"

The thoughts that come to mind are like those of Ezekiel when he looked over the valley of dry bones (Ezekiel 37:1-3, 11-14). Death surrounded Ezekiel wherever he looked. Likewise, no matter how much higher New York builds her buildings, those gray tombstones will still have the last word. Not even the power of the most powerful human city can stop the march of death.

Death is not much talked about. It cuts short our dreams, removes our companions, and leaves us alone. We each must face that "valley of dry bones" Ezekiel describes. No matter how great our human knowledge or how strong our power - we each reach that point - the total bankruptcy of human energy.

Ezekiel looks at the valley of dry bones in his day and asks "Can these bones ever live again? When human hopes run dry will these ever be any refreshment of hope and life again?"

And God answers, "When all human power is gone, I will give

my power to them."

Sound familiar? Open your hymnals to the Baptismal Service. There in the heart of the page is the blessing, "that you shall know the Lord and the power of His resurrection..."

The promise of the resurrection is not abstract; it is not a foolish hope, wish or dream. It has been given to you in Christ's resurrection. Luther wrote: "The resurrection is written in every new leaf of springtime." God brings His life and hope. Death has lost its power. Happy Easter!

A search of Scripture turns up one rather surprising truth: there are no exemplary families. Not a single family is portrayed in Scripture in such a way so as to evoke admiration in us. There are many family stories, there is considerable reference to family life, and there is sound counsel to guide the growth of families, but not a single model family for anyone to look up to in either awe or envy.

At the very least, this means that no one needs to carry a burden of guilt because his or her family is deficient in the sweetness and light that Christian families are supposed to exhibit. Since models for harmonious families are missing in Scripture (and for that omission I am repeatedly grateful to the Holy Spirit), we are free to pay attention to what is there - a promise of new community which experiences life as the household of faith, a family in Christ. Life together consists of rela-

tionships that are created not by blood (at least not by our blood) but by grace. We get along because we are forgiven. It is more important, I think, that families be used as places to develop faith than that faith be used as a resource to develop families.



RESURRECTION COOKIES (To prepare the vening before Easter)

RESURRECTION COOKIES

1 C whole pecans 3 egg whites 1 C sugar 1 t vinegar pinch of salt



You will need: wooden spoon, Bible, zipper baggie, tape

Place pecans in zipper baggie and let the children beat them with the wooden spoon to break into small pieces. Explain that after Jesus was arrested, he was beaten by the Roman soldiers. (Read John 19:1-3)

Let the children smell the vinegar. Put 1 t into mixing bowl. Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross, he was given vinegar to drink. (Read John 19:28-30)

Add egg whites to vinegar. Eggs represent life. Explain that Jesus gave His life to give us life. (Read John 10:10-11)

Sprinkle a little salt into each child's hand. Let them taste it and brush the rest into the bowl. Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers, and the bitterness of our own sin. (Read Luke 23:27)

So far, the ingredients are not very appetizing. Add 1 C sugar. Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him. (Read Psalm 34:8 and John 3:16)

Beat with a mixer on high speed for 11-15 minutes until stiff peaks are formed. Explain that the color white represents the purity in God's eyes of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. (Read Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3)

Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto waxed paper covered cookie sheet. Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid. (Read Matthew 27:65-66)

Put cookie sheet in oven. Close the door and turn the oven OFF!. Give each child a piece of tape and seal the oven door shut. Explain that Jesus' tomb was sealed. (Read Matthew 27:65-66)

GO TO BED!

Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight. Jesus' followers also were in despair when the tomb was sealed. (Read John 16:20-22)

On Resurrection morning, open the oven and give everyone a cookie! Notice the cracked surface and take a bite. The cookies are hollow! On the first Resurrection Day, Jesus' followers were amazed to find the tomb open and empty. (Read Matthew 28:1-9)




