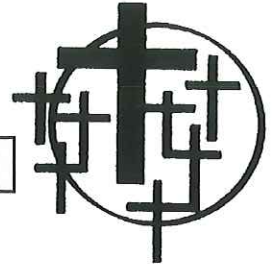

## HOLY WEEK . . God's People Gather

It'll be here soon—the Week called “Holy.” As long as I can remember, that week meant going to church more than usual. As a kid growing up in a Lutheran Pastor’s home, that was a source of frustration to me.

This was also “Easter Vacation” week. Our time spent playing outside in the emerging Spring weather was invaded by times we “had to go to Church.”

There were week-long noon devotions at a movie theatre downtown where all the Lutherans gathered and the school choir (us) had to sing. Then there were the evening services at our own church. Even as a kid, I perceived them to be significant and somehow moving, but an hour is a lot of time for a kid to sit still. And then if Dad carried the service over another 5 minutes!!!! Oh my, what a sacrifice had to be made. And now here I am at the other end

of my life dealing with those same services of Holy Week—Thursday, Friday, and Sunday. I have finally grown up enough to value them as some of the best time spent in church all year.

I feel it is a pity if people cut right to Easter without experiencing the rest of the “Triduum,” the “three days.”

How moving to hear Jesus taken a 1,500 year-old meal and turn it into a new way of remembering God’s working. Now, we are to remember Jesus. We are to remember the “joy” that led Him to and through the cross. We are to gather often and remember and receive what His death offers—forgiveness, love, and life!

It is important to stand in the insanity and cruelty and mystery of the Friday we call Good, and to see the wonder of love make it all turn out alright! After all the inhumanity, darkness, and death, to hear a Roman officer

exclaim, “Surely, this was the Son of God!”

It is so important to take time-out of whatever its claim on our time and share those moments of worship with our community of faith at Concordia. It is the worship of those days that give depth and meaning to the proclamation we share on Easter: “The Lord is Risen!”

“He is Risen Indeed!”

Come join our worship on Maundy Thursday and on Good Friday at 7:00 PM. Easter will be celebrated at 6:30 AM with a Sunrise Service, focusing on Holy Baptism, and also at 8:00 and 10:30 with a celebration of Holy Communion.

Ruth and I will stay that week in Steamboat Springs so we can participate with you in the Week that is Holy.

John 12:47 *For I did not come to judge the world, but to save it.*

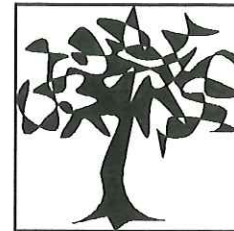
John 14:6 *Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."*

## SPECIAL DONATIONS

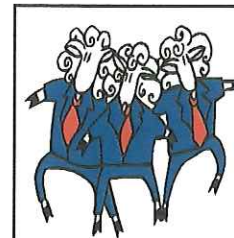

**Gethsemane Blue** a word from the Parish Administrator

Does sorrow have a color? Several weeks ago after choir rehearsal, I walked out into an evening sky where the skyline and trees were etched in black against a luminous and deep midnight blue sky. It reminded me of the cover on a piece of choir music we sing on Maundy Thursday called, “In the Garden.” It conveys Jesus’ sorrow praying in the Garden of Gethsemane before His betrayal by Judas. As I took in the quality and color of that dark night, I named it a color - Gethsemane blue.

*“Then Jesus went with his disciples to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to them, “Sit here while I go over there and pray.” He took Peter and the two sons of Zebedee along with him, and he began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then he said to them, “My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me.”*

*Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, “My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will.”*

*Then he returned to his disciples and found them sleeping. “Could you men not keep watch with me for one hour? He asked Peter. “Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the body is weak.” Matthew 26:36-41* Jesus Christ, in the garden, was well aware of the darkness which

he was going to face on Calvary’s cross. Knowing what was ahead, He stays the course. His future was as sharply etched as the blackness of trees against a luminous dark blue sky’s backdrop, and yet He said to his Father, “not as I will, but as you will.”

During this Lenten journey, I am struck, perhaps for the first time, of not only Christ’s sorrow at the path he was to take, but at the disciples inability to stay awake. I have always thought of the disciples lazy, selfish and inconsiderate friends. How could they ‘not’ stay awake with their friend Jesus? Certainly, *I would have remained awake with the sorrowing Jesus. Or would I? I am not so sure. I have begun to identify with those sleeping disciples. Perhaps, they were caught up in their own sorrows and thus, failed to see that Jesus, their teacher, was overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. In Luke’s telling of this same evening in the garden, he makes one important distinction. “When he rose from prayer and went back to the disciples, he found them asleep, exhausted from sorrow.” Luke 22:45*

*Exhausted from sorrow.* The disciples have just shared the Passover, “the Lord’s Supper” with Jesus and were warned of betrayal and denial amongst the twelve. Also, Jesus has made them aware that danger would be in the future for those who would follow Him. The disciples must have been deeply trou-

bled as well—exhausted emotionally by the uncertainty of their future with Jesus. What did the words conveyed by Jesus to them at the Last Supper mean?

Do I, like the disciples fail to see that good thing which is right in front of me? They had Jesus’ physical presence and failed to see beyond their own selves. He is still present in my life and I fail to see the goodness in my midst. I can fall into a spiritual sleep, exhausted by sorrow. But, even as the disciples in the garden were encouraged to ‘wake up’, Jesus, through His word and the working of the Holy Spirit, continues to remind me to ‘wake up.’ Those who sleep, exhausted from sorrow, have the promise of a *new life* in the Lord who saves us from our sleep. If you are exhausted by sorrow, Jesus will refresh you in the proof of his love—death on the cross. Continue to watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation.” Jesus lives and he continues to prod and encourage us to “wake up, stay awake and listen!”

A midnight blue sky will always bring to mind for me my color of sorrow—Gethsemane blue. But the deep blue night also promises the coming of a new day in Christ Jesus. As we struggle to stay awake through our nights of sorrow, we move towards the fulfilled joy of an Easter morning sunrise and an empty tomb. The color of light has come, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

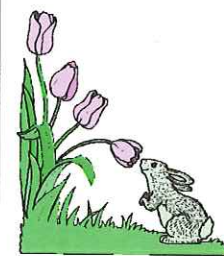
Other important LWML news:

Hello and God's blessings to everyone! The Trustees met on March 13, 2001.

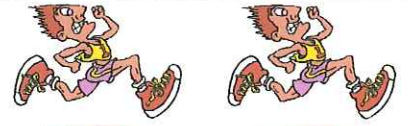
- We discussed the completion of the showers in the downstairs bathrooms.

## RECOVERY CORNER

### Flashing Your Brights

"How many of us here today have ever been concerned about another person's use of alcohol or other drugs? Maybe we didn't think they were alcoholics, but we wondered about what we saw happening when they were under the influence. Maybe it was a parent when we were growing up. Maybe a younger person. Maybe a friend or coworker. At one time or another how many of us have felt concern about how another person was using alcohol or other drugs? According to a federal study, 43 percent of adult Americans have had the same kind of concern.

"Next question: how many of us felt we should say something about it? How many of us actually did say something? That's hard, isn't it? What are you supposed to say? Maybe they're nice people. This can happen to anybody. You don't want to hurt their feelings. Maybe the problem will get better. What can you do about another person's drinking problem? You can't make someone else stop.

"When you see a car at night with its headlights out, you don't try to turn their lights on for them. But you don't say, 'There's nothing I can do.' You flash your brights. Likewise, with chemically troubled people you can flash your brights.

"Sometimes we actually see good results from this, but many times we run into lies, blaming, rejection. It's not surprising. People with chemical problems normally don't see the problems. It's easy to feel like a failure when you get those negative reactions. But the truth is that by flashing your brights, you've been successful. It often takes many flashings before a person actually understands or changes. In fact, interviews of 259 patients at the Independence Center (a treatment facility in Lincoln, Nebraska) revealed that it took between 10 and 11 flashings before people began to seek help.

"Flashing your brights is an act of faith. It is trusting that you are not wasting your time or God's love, trusting that God has made you part of a cosmic conspiracy of light flashers who over time will have an impact on that person. It took six years and many people to flash some light into the darkness of my alcohol problem. Without them I would not be in recovery today."

## DO YOU KNOW WHAT YOU ARE GIVING TO MISSIONS?

For starters, we thought it would be good to inform our members of what we are already currently doing by way of financial support of mission efforts locally and around the world. For instance, did you know that this year, from our regular church offerings, we will be supporting the mission programs of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod (LCMS) with \$12,000. Lift-Up of Routt County is also budgeted to receive regular offerings in the amount of \$2,000. We will be highlighting just what some of these outreach efforts are doing in months to come.

In addition, our own LWML (Lutheran Women's Missionary League) is donating \$10,900 to approximately 22 (proposed) local, national, and international mission efforts. This tremendous donation is a result of a year's worth of hard work and fund-raising.
