





DO YOU KNOW WHAT YOU ARE GIVING TO OUTREACH?

Through our LWML (Women's Guild), Concordia supports a very important local organization called ADVOCATES AGAINST BATTERING & ABUSE. This is a mission to those who suffer from domestic violence, and provides a safe haven for them. The Ad-

vocates office offers around the clock response to victims, including crisis counseling and a residential protected shelter. They also provide criminal justice advocacy, civil restraining order assistance, and safety planning. Last, but not least, they offer community education on violence prevention, including high school peer education. Advocates will receive \$200 from Concordia this year.

MINISTRIES OF PREVENTION

Youth and adults alike in this society identify alcohol and drug problems as major issues with which they contend. Research repeatedly shows that belonging to a faith community and attending worship at least once a month deter drug and alcohol use among young people (Benson, 1990). If the simple act of going to church once a month is so effective a deterrent, how much more might be achieved in a congregation that takes an active approach to prevention? A ministry of prevention can support young people in finding direction for their lives, in gaining the strength of identity as well as the information and skills they need to make wise choices. It can involve the entire "village" in raising young people who tackle their problems head on rather than escaping into drugs or alcohol.

Current research also reveals how great a deterrent to alcohol and drug use parents can be. Though they often feel powerless, parents have much more influence than they know. Teenagers who don't drink or use drugs report that it's because they don't want to upset their parents. Unfortunately, many parents miss the chance to prevent or delay their children's use of substances because they don't know how.

Wielding their power of deterrence requires that parents communicate their values and expectations to their children consistently over time using age-appropriate messages. This process demands: **first**, that parents know what they want and believe; **second**, that they talk to their children; and **third**, that they possess a basic understanding of substance abuse and young people's developmental needs. Clarifying their own guidelines for drinking and using drugs, including prescription medications, also helps parents give consistent messages. Ministries of prevention can guide adults through this process of self-searching and education. They can help parents help their children make healthy decisions about alcohol and other drugs.

Faith Partners defines prevention as efforts that:

- Delay the onset of first and experimental use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs;
- Support abstinence as a healthy and positive decision;
- Support moderate, appropriate and legal use of alcohol;
- Support the appropriate and legal use of prescribed and over-the-counter medications; and
- Eliminate the illegal use of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs.

"I want Jesus to follow me..."

A word from the Parish Administrator

Driving to church early Sunday morning I was warming up my voice for Choir rehearsal. "I want Jesus to follow me," I sang, and then caught myself abruptly. Well, there's a mental slip for you, I thought to myself. The words are supposed to be "I want Jesus to walk with me," not follow me. It was a subtle reminder of a reality I face—me wanting to be in control, and wanting Jesus as a backup to bail me out—if necessary.



Since I was already in my car it was easy to arrive at another analogy. If you've ever had to drive an undependable vehicle (and I guess, who ever knows if their car is going to get them to the next place?) it's often comforting to have someone follow behind you, *just in case* something goes wrong. If the car ends up stalled along the roadside it is reassuring to know that the person following will be right along to help you out of the mess. However, the following vehicle is only necessary if you do crash and burn. "Please follow me," I might ask, "so that if I have any trouble you can bail me out." Sadly enough, I often live in a relationship with God in that way. I want Jesus to follow me.

A slip of the tongue helped me to recognize a lack of vision on my part. I should more consciously affirm that I want to "see" Jesus walking with me. He does

walk with us, whether we care to recognize it or not. But do I "walk" acknowledging his close proximity? Or do I, perhaps, prefer to have Him bring up the rear? If Jesus were in the same vehicle with me, when the car stops working, I guess He's there in the car with me, dealing with the same mess. Who in the heck is going to come along and rescue me? There are these worldly problems I want fixed. Do I want a God who runs the eternal towing service bringing up the rear to "fix" all the calamities that face me—or am I tuned into sensing the presence of God with me in all things? I am inclined to want a God who will follow me and fix the immediate situation, rather than have a God who is present with me and walking alongside of me. Why does a 'fix-it' God bring a sense of comfort?

The Jews of Jesus' day struggled with the same kinds of issues. They wanted Jesus to be a messiah who would "fix" the problems and political struggles of their world. They failed to see that Jesus was able to mend so much more than the immediate needs they were caught up in. I am not so different, although I would like to set myself apart from those "short-sighted" Jews. Jesus came to save us (me) for an eternity with Him and to heal the sick (me) and to help the blind see (me). The roadside emergencies are of little consequence in comparison to what Jesus can and has done for us. He can do far more than get us to the next service station, or give us a perfectly running vehicle. Jesus doesn't always 'fix' what burdens us but he will share in the burdens. Jesus brings us wholeness through His unconditional love, abounding grace, continual mercy and saving us from our bondage to sin. That is God's answer to "fixing" our human situation. If I am seeing clearly—God's way brings true comfort.

What about you? Do you use God as a back-up plan in case of an emergency? Or do you recognize the presence of God walking with you, as a source of strength and encouragement in the midst of worldly calamities? My prayers need to be continually shaped to ask for my vision to improve—that I might see with the eyes of faith His continual presence in my life, and that I might daily recognize that Jesus walks with me.


Tenets, Tidbits and Trails . . . the Elder's report

Have you ever been put on the spot as a Christian? An interesting and embarrassing experience happened to me a few weeks ago. I went downstairs to drop my daughter off in Sunday School and a very astute teacher asked me in front of the class, "Hi, Elder Jim, why don't you recite John 3:16 for the class!" My mind went blank. I forced out a mumbled version and only got halfway through before the teacher rescued me. Of course, I know this verse from childhood, but I wasn't ready to share God's Word in a moment's notice. I was completely wrapped up in getting myself to Church on time with the kids—the last thing on my mind was worship or carrying the Christian message. I thanked this teacher later as she began to apologize for putting me on the spot. I learned an important lesson.

Are we ready to carry the message in a moment's notice? Have we missed opportunities in our day-to-day lives to spread the Gospel, listen to someone, or make ourselves more prepared? Are we just too busy to stop and smell the roses? My rose is God's grace, and many times I fail to stop and smell God's grace in my life.

Peter 1:13 states, "Therefore, prepare your minds for action..." This verse refers to physical action. James 2:17 says, "...faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead." Although works alone may not save you, faith is made complete by what you do. I love the saying, "It is your job to pedal the bike, just let God do the steering." Whenever I try to take over the steering, my actions are self-centered and self-seeking. I am trying to do what God wants to do for me. I lose focus on my primary mission, which is to carry the message. How do we respond to the gift of being saved? Privately holding the truth to ourselves, leading by example, or trusting our faith in God to help spread the Word?

I pray that each of us will start our course of action by picking up the Bible and reading it. This basic action can literally change the world. God's grace and peace be with you all.
