

Stephen Ministry



TOOLS FOR LIVING

Secure in the abundance of God's grace in Christ, we are moved to help one another in our affliction, our distress, and in all kinds of brokenness. When our brokenness manifests itself in the form of addiction, whether chemical or behavioral, is when we can identify with the words of Jesus when He referred to people in need as "the least of these." We have all been there. More importantly, Jesus has been there before us and He knows our despair and turmoil. I think that Psalm 46 depicts the turmoil that often erupts within our soul. "Though our earth gives

way...though our mountains fall...though our waters roar and foam" within us, describes the battles that rages in our lives. The prophet Isaiah states in Isaiah 61:1 that the anointed one, Jesus, would bind up the broken-hearted. The Psalmist gives this affirmation in 46:9 when he writes, "He (God) causes wars to cease, our wars." In verse 11, he proclaims that "God is our refuge." This reflects God's abundant grace in Christ. To be sure, the battle goes on, but it is not our battle alone. God is on our side and by the sacrificial atonement of His Son Jesus on the cross, and His stepping forth out of the grave, seals the victory. It is not our sacrifice, but the sacrifice of Jesus that makes the difference. This action of God defines our ending. We often wish that we could go back and start over, but that is not possible. We have all gone in places that we wish we hadn't, in thought, word, and deed. Through the abundant grace of God in Christ, our journey is changed and directed. We don't have to get worse before we change. God doesn't shame us into change, but gently takes us where we are, one step at a time.

Jesus set the standard of servanthood. In His miraculous way of blessing us, He has designed us to serve one another. That is the purpose of our *Tools for Living* Program—to serve one another. Our community of faith can be secure in the abundance of God's grace in Christ to offer help, to give direction, to give support, and to lend a hand. In Psalm 23:5, we have evidence of this in these words; "you anoint my head with oil, my cup runs over." There is abundance. God doesn't ration out His grace but gives of it freely and it can reach into the dark and far corners of our life.

It is the abundant grace of God in Christ Jesus that is the foundation of our *Tools for Living* endeavor. God told Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you and it is sufficient for each one of us in our need." God, in His abundant grace, has given us many gifts in the form of people. He gives us people that are willing to use their gifts in the service of one another; people that share their gifts and insights in support groups, people that share their gifts of training in the giving of understanding and guidance in our behavior, people that are pastors and others in the faith community that guide, help, encourage, and pray with and for one another.

Y es, we are secure in the abundance of God's grace in Christ Jesus—therefore, we serve one another. If you have any concerns, please feel free to contact any member of the *Tools for Living* Team, or our Pastor.

NOTES FROM AND TO THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE MEMBERS (THAT'S All OF US, FOLKS!!!)


"Count the cost..." Luke 14:25-33






LCEF—What Is It?






