

Most Christians would agree that the single most important act that we can do on behalf of the church is to pray. Revelations and psalms tell us that our prayers act as "incense before His throne." But is there sometimes another step we can take, after prayer? This question has plagued me as an elder for sometime. Is there some action that could/should follow prayer?

Sometimes I find myself guilty of not taking full advantage of the opportunities to serve the many needs of our spiritual family. Yes, I may pray, but is there action that could easily be taken afterwards that I neglect?



TOOLS FOR LIVING

WAYS TO HUMBLE YOURSELF by Alfred Ells, M.C.

- Routinely confess your sin to God. (Luke 18:9-14) All of us sin and fall short of the glory of God. However, too few of us have a routine practice of rigorous self-honesty examination. Weekly, even daily, review of our heart and behavior, coupled with confession to God, is an essential practice of humility.
- Acknowledge your sin to others. (James 3:2, James 5:16) Humility before God is not complete unless there is also humility before man. A true test of our willingness to humble ourselves is being willing to share with others the weaknesses we confess to God. Wisdom, however, dictates that we do so with others that we trust.
- Take wrong patiently. (1 Peter 3:8-17) When something is unjust I want to react and rectify it. However, patiently responding to the unjust accusations and actions of others demonstrates our strength of godly character and provides and opportunity to put on humility.
- Phoenix area, a local East valley pastor was noted for graciously receiving any negative feedback or correction offered. He would simply say "thank you for caring enough to share that with me, I will pray about it and get back to you." Look for the kernel of truth in what people offer you, even if it comes from a dubious source. Always pray, "Lord, what are you trying to show me through this?"
- Accept a lowly place. (Proverbs 25:6,7) If you find yourself wanting to sit at the head table, wanting others to recognize your contribution or become offended when others are honored or chosen, then pride is present. Purpose to support others being recognized, rather than you.
- Choose to serve others. (Philippians 1:1, 2 Corinthians 4:5, Matthew 23:11) When we serve others, we are serving God's purposes in their lives. Doing so reduces our focus on ourselves and builds the Kingdom of God instead of the Kingdom of self.
- Cultivate a grateful heart. (1 Thessalonians 5:18) The more we develop an attitude of gratitude for the gift of salvation and life He has given us, the more true our perspective of self. A grateful heart is a humble heart.
- Purpose to speak well of others. (Ephesians 4:31-32) Saying negative things about others puts them "one down" and us "one up"...a form of pride. Speaking well of others edifies them and builds them up instead of us. Make sure, however, that what you say is not intended as flattery.
- Treat pride as a condition that always necessitates embracing the cross. (Luke 9:23) It is our nature to be proud and it is God's nature in us that brings humility. Committing to a daily dying to self and living through Him is the foundation for true humility.

"Wilderness Survival"

A word from your Parish Administrator

"Do you have any idea where you're going?" - God

"How often they rebelled against him in the desert and grieved him in the wasteland! Again and again they put God to the test; they vexed the Holy One of Israel. They did not remember his power -- the day he redeemed them from the oppressor, the day he displayed his miraculous signs in Egypt." Psalm 78:4043

This past week Steamboat Springs hosted 700 doctors from around the country who came to the Wilderness Medical Conference. The weeklong seminar included instruction on how to survive in the wilderness. Perhaps that is a skill we could all use some instruction in. People who grow up in Colorado don't take the wilderness for granted when they venture into the great outdoors. They have learned to prepare for the elements. But there is another wilderness that is not of a physical nature. Sometimes we need to learn how to survive in an emotional and/or spiritual wilderness. How does one prepare for that? When you're making your way through life's deserts and wastelands of uncharted territory --how are your survival skills? How do you find your way?

The Israelites had 40 years in the desert to learn their survival skills. Over time they learned where their sole survival came from. God. Often they failed to remember who had redeemed them. In their complaining and fear of the unknown, they forgot to survive by the words of one who had never failed them -- their God.

There is a billboard sign that says: "Do you have any idea where you're going?" -- God It's intriguing to me that the question is coming from God. I can well imagine the Israelites complaining to Moses, "do you have any idea where you're going?" as they wandered in the desert. I have asked the question myself of someone who won't ask for directions. My kids have said to me on more than one occasion, "do you have any idea where you're going?" I must admit, that sometimes I have utterly lost my way.

Lent is an appropriate time for us to think about our sense of direction. Think about the 40 days of Lent as a wilderness survival seminar for the soul. Where do we look for guidance? Where is the roadmap that leads us into the promised land? There are many times when I try, perhaps, even prefer, to navigate the wilderness in my life by my own instincts and my own personal survival skills. But they fall short. When life is stripped down to the bones what is of real necessity? What are the priorities? Who will save me from the desert experiences of life? It is important that I focus on the power of God. It is important for remember the salvation stories of God who continually redeems his people and brings living water into the desert. It is God on whom I need to depend for my very life. When I rebel and grieve my desert experiences, it is time for me to remember some vital survival skills and refocus my attention on God. During this Lenten season take time to "remember his power--the day he redeemed them from the oppressor, the day he displayed his miraculous signs in Egypt." Remember Who saves you from the wasteland of sin and ushers you into the promised land --your Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Scoop from the Sup ... Ellyn Myller

Did you know that the kids (4-10 yrs olds) in our Sunday school ministry are getting a new generational name? They are most likely going to be dubbed the "NET GENERATION". This generation will grow-up on the computer!! Let me share some of the information that I got at the Colorado Christian Ministries Convention about these kids.

These kids are being raised in a Culture with disappearing moral values, rising violence, rapid change, a devaluation of life, a disappearing family structure and they are permeated with media. By the time that they graduate from high school they will have spent more time in front of a TV then in the classroom. The average family will have watched 7 hours of TV a day and 57% of those shows will contain violence. Our kids will witness 200,000 acts of violence by the time they reach 18, and 73% of the perpetrators in those scenes of violence will go unpunished.

These kids will suffer from obesity due to "pushing around a mouse", rather than playing outside. They will want to make a marriage work, but will have lacked good role models. They will deal with questions that we haven't even thought of, and be catered to by the world. They will make 250 trips to the mall/market per year - let's remember, there are only 365 days/year!

WOW - Have we got our work cut out for us! It was said at this workshop, "Maybe they should be called NETLESS, because they haven't much to count on." Much of what they will be exposed to and have to face will cause them to be fearful and not able to trust.

This is where the GOSPEL, GOOD NEWS, the HOPE that we have in Jesus Christ and His redeeming work on the cross can make a difference! Our Kids were of such great value that Jesus gave His life for them, so that they could have life and have it to the full. Now I'm not talking about stuff and entertaining experiences...and all those things that the world puts great value on; I'm talking about a life filled with faith, hope and love!

There is a lot of subtle and not so subtle stuff out there undermining what we want to teach our kids about what is important, how to behave, and what to believe. We need to make sure that our lives reflect the image we want to bear and as a Christian that should be the image of Christ. Because we are Christians we should be different, not out of the world, definitely in it, but different because we belong to Christ!





Stewardship

ONE OF MY FAVORITE COMIC STRIPS WAS "THE BORN LOSER." One Sunday edition showed the strips primary character, Brutus Thornapple, trudging down the street on a winter day wearing a weary and depressed expression.

The successive frames of the cartoon let the reader in on the following thoughts going through Brutus' mind:

I don't get it...I just don't get it...If
I try to earn more money, I'm called a
money-grubber...If I keep it I'm a
hoarder. On the other hand, if I spend it,
I don't have the sense to save it...and if
I do save it, I'm a pinch-penny! If I
don't accumulate lots, I have no
savvy...If I don't try to get more, I have
no ambition. If I'm lucky enough to fall
into a bundle, I'm a leech...and after a
lifetime of saving a few bucks for my old
age, I'm a poor slob who never knew
the joys of living.

Finally, Brutus arrives at his destination, the local pub. He says to the bartender, "Draw me a cool one, Wally." Then, in the final frame, we see Brutus perched on a bar stool thinking, "Come to think of it, if I stop off for a quick one to relax and forget all that palaver, I'm a lush!"

Poor old Brutus. He just can't win. I guess that's why he's called "The Born Loser." Brutus identified several possible relationships with money — money-grubber, hoarder, spendthrift, pinch-penny, leech, and so forth. But

he missed one very important one, that of *giver*.

The essence of Brutus brooding was that each of the money/person connections he thought of all led to dead ends. Perhaps he was exaggerating some of those money related activities (saving for old age doesn't necessarily make a person a "poor slob who never knew the joys of living"), but essentially Brutus was right; investing too much of ourselves in an alliance with money is a

GIVING THIS LENT AND EVERY SEASON

God has given each of us, in varying amounts, his gifts of time, talents and treasure. We are stewards, or caretakers, of these gifts and have a responsibility to use them to help build up the kingdom of God, to build a better world and a better Church.

By sacrificial giving, we give back to God a share of the treasures we have received, thereby helping to build up the Church and to aid the suffering and needy of the world.

The amount of sacrifice

We all know that it is easy to give when that which we give has no importance or value to us. God knows the real value of our gift because he knows the amount of sacrifice that is behind each gift. The rich man may give a large sum of money, but his gift represents no sacrifice to him. God may better cherish the meager gift of a poor man. True stewardship means sacrificial giving.

It's not easy

Not everyone will find sacrificial giving easy. It can require much pulling back from your other expenditures. It is an easy way to become a better Christian.

Our security

Our gift becomes sacrificial when it comes from our substance rather than our abundance. When we give of our "first fruits" and not the leftovers, we are saying, in essence, that our security lies not in our material resources but in God.

A GREAT TEAM IF PLAYERS TOGETHER GIVE THEIR BEST



Twelve-year old Daniel is an excellent soccer player. His brother, nine-year old Andrew, is progressing well in playing this sport. Recently, after Andrew played a great game, his brother complimented him on his many good moves, his passes, the goals he made. The list of positive accomplishments was an honest evaluation from Daniel. Andrew listened quietly and thoughtfully. Then he said, "You know if they cloned me ten times I'd make a great team."

Andrew has learned something about soccer. He knew he had played his best. He had put forth all the effort his mind and his skinny little body could offer. But he also has learned about giving and about team work. A great game is accomplished by giving your best. A great team is made up of players who together will give their very best.

The same is true of our gifts to God. Whether it's our time, our talents, or our treasure, we want to offer God our very best. And when all of us offer God our very best, we make a great team of Christians, who are, as saint Paul says in Philippians 3:14, "pressing on toward the goal or the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ, Jesus."

RESPOND TO OTHERS' NEEDS

Almsgiving comes from the root word meaning mercy-giving. It means not only the giving of my resources to others, of recognizing and responding to the needs of others. It also means the sharing of my time, to be available, a gift of my talents. Almsgiving calls us to see each other as brother and sisters, to serving our church and others. Lent invites us to live with what we really do need and to share the rest.

THE PRIVILEGE OF PARTNERSHIP WITH GOD

An article in Forbes magazine told of a Florida business executive who decided several years ago to go into partnership with God. The realtors of Keyes Company agreed with the executive and introduced the tithing system into their business. They wanted to acknowledge God's ownership and give 10 percent of the firm's profits to the church.

Each succeeding year, the company showed an increase in business and profits, and eventually the firm became one of the largest realtors in Florida. Today, many companies are giving back in ways that are changing society.

We are co-workers

Yet there are people in our society that provide abundantly for themselves but give little or no thought to the needs of the Lord's cause. They fail to realize that one reason God formulated the plan of enlisting us as his co-workers is so we might not lose the blessings of benevolence.

God knew that people would be happier taking part in His great work, God has chosen to channel His divine gifts through human beings. He has appointed us to help our fellow men and women. God tests us here with temporal possessions, and in using them we can be remembered as faithful stewards and partners in his great "firm."

SOMEDAY IS NEVER PART OF ANY WEEK


Most people live on an eight day week – not a seven day week.

thing; go, sell what you have, and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." (Mark 10:21). The one money relationship that young man had not explored was that of **giver**, and that was the only one that would lead to "treasure in heaven."



There is an absolute correlation between what we give and what we receive. There is the story of a monastery in Austria which once had great wealth. It remained prosperous as long as it was charitable to the poor. Eventually, however, the residents of the monastery stopped giving and the prosperity ceased.

One day, a poor man went to the

door of this place seeking aid, which was denied him. When he asked why, the keeper of the gate told him that the monastery was itself impoverished.

The monk told the poor man a parable. He said that the monastery once had two brethren, one named DATE (gave) and one named DABITUR (it shall be given to you.) DATE, he said, had been thrust out of the monastery; DABITUR then left of his own accord.

Part of the Christian message is that God has removed the dead ends. Easter, for example, affirms the reality that death is not an end, but a beginning of life without end.

The Christian way of living too, is a way that leads us on paths which do not end in impasses, but enhance our ongoing life in Christ.

Giving, sharing that which we have with others, is the best of all possible relationships with money. DATE and DABITUR are intimately related. When we take care of DATE, DABITUR takes care of us. Giving is one of the things which keeps us from being born losers at dead ends.

Come to think of it, the Christian faith includes the assurance that in ultimate terms, we are all born to win. It's just that when we fail to give, it becomes awfully easy to lose our way. Giving is one of the activities that sends us in the right direction.
