LOG JAM . . . A word from the Parish Administrator



Rethink your images of Jesus. We have heard the good shepherd analogy since childhood and for good reason. We learn something about our Savior when we say He is the "good shepherd." Jesus also might be referred to as a fine logger from the Washington coast. He has the ability to break up the log jams which can cause severe blockage. Blockage of hearts and minds - the locked up masses of sin and bitterness. You don't hear Jesus literally saying, "Break it up!" but I do believe the intent is there.

In Women's Bible Study we have been studying the book of Matthew. We are watching the scripture unfold before our eyes in "The Visual Bible." It is a dramatic interpretation of the exact words in Matthew from beginning to end. A vision of Jesus during his sermon on the mount (Matt. 7:1-5) keeps coming back to me. In the video, the man portraying Jesus picks up this huge log and holds it next to his eye and says these words: "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when all the time there is a plank in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the plank out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye." Jesus smiles. The crowd listening understands. They all smile. Yeah, that's a pretty crazy thing to try and do.

In the past few weeks I have personally struggled with starting a new job as "Jean's Speck Removal Service," but a picture of Jesus and that log keeps popping up in my brain. With every speck I want to remove, the planks are building up. Perhaps I am creating my own personal log jam in the vision of my heart. In AA language, I have to do a little personal inventory. Maybe more than a little. Where do / need to look in the mirror.? Where do / need to go and have those logs broken up so that the waters of grace can flow more freely in my life? I have some work to do. I will always have work to do. But, I know this incredibly gifted logger who is about the business of breaking up log jams. You might know Him as the Good Shepherd.

Scoop from the Sup...



Take... the SWORD OF THE SPIRIT, which is the WORD OF GOD. Ephesians 6:17

All year we have been putting on the armor of God. Every piece that we have made and reflected on protects or prepares us for the battle. But, now we know that we are in a battle, because we are taking up our weapon, which is the Word of God.

Let's think about the men and women of today who enter our armed forces. What do they do first, they enlist. Then they get equipped. And then they go to boot camp to be trained how to fight. They study and handle their weapon in order to be comfortable with it. They learn how to aim before they shoot. They practice using it!

This is a great analogy for the weapon that God has given us to defend against the attacks of Satan. We must study and handle the Word of God, so that we are comfortable with it. We must practice and learn what we are aiming at so that we are prepared to use it!

In each case Jesus used the Word of God to fight off the temptation to give in (let Satan win) and kept His focus on God's purpose, plan, and person.


How well are we prepared to use the weapon God has given us to "take a stand against the devil's evil schemes"? Being a Christian soldier is about being in Bible boot camp for life.

- 1) Decide if it would be helpful for you to have someone to talk to about your concerns.
- 2) Call Pastor Scott, Jan Fritz, or any Stephen Minister and let them know yes, I could use a helping hand.
- 3) Either decide yourself which Stephen Minister you think would be most helpful to you or talk Pastor or Jan Fritz and they will help you decide.
- 4) Set up a meeting. These meetings are flexible, confidential and directed towards your needs. You may call any of us yourself or you can indicate you'd like us to call you. These meetings are intended to have closure at some point, but this tool is flexible, dependent on your needs.

Servanthood is one of the basic principles of Jesus' teaching. The purpose of the Stephen Ministry is to provide Christian support for you as you work through life's transitions. Let us serve you.





TOOLSFORLIVING

Like many churches Concordia is family oriented, blessed with many children and we have made a commitment to serve them with Sunday school, VBS, confirmation classes, youth group and by calling a full-time DCE. We are also a church aware of the pain in the world and like other churches we have invested time and resources to train Stephen Ministers to be there for people in times of need. But we are the only church in the area that has a ministry that deals with addiction, recovery and prevention. This unique ministry in called Tools for Living.

This past year the TFL team has been working hard to become educated about addiction, recovery and prevention. We have read numerous books, attended AA and Alanon meetings, watched videos about addiction and prevention, and attended an intervention class presented by Ruth Koenig. Many of us knew a lot about addiction, but none of us knew much about prevention. It has been fascinating and eye-opening. Several months ago Jean Smith attended a four day workshop on prevention offered by the Colorado Alcohol Drug Abuse Department (ADAD) and came back armed with tons of information and ideas. The needs and opportunities in this area are huge and overwhelming, but exciting.

The latest research has found that "Families play the most important role in determining how children handle the temptations to use alcohol, cigarettes, and illegal drugs." Research has also identified risk factors and discovered (no surprise to us) that churches or "faith based communities" can play a vital role in prevention of substance abuse. TFL asked how we could best help in the area of prevention. But the opportunities are vast. How are we to get our arms around this?

When a workshop sponsored by ADAD called "Using Strategic Planning to Accomplish Your Goals" was offered, I jumped at the chance to go and it was awesome. Strategic planning will help us focus in on our mission, help us set our goals for accomplishing that mission, and provide ways to evaluate how we are doing. It would be wonderful if our church would use strategic planning, too.

Please pray for the Tools For Living Ministry Team as we go about the process of examining our mission, and setting our goals. And please pray for God to show us all ways in which we can help strengthen families and come along side when they are in crisis.


