TRUSTEES' REPORT


The Trustees meeting was scheduled for Tuesday August 6, 2002, but only one member was present. Since the

TOOLS FOR LIVING

WELCOME, WE'RE SO GLAD YOU'RE HERE!

Those are words all of us love to hear, aren't they. A feeling of warmth, acceptance and value are imparted with just those six little words. That's how I was made to feel when I attended my first ADAD (Alcohol Drug Abuse Department) Conference in Pueblo.

Why were they so welcoming? Well, it's simple. Alcohol and drug abuse affects every facet of American life. It lowers our productivity; it harms us physically and emotionally. Studies show that one in four children have a parent who drinks too much. Our children model and learn from us and so the pattern repeats itself. But this disease can be thwarted and faith based communities are important allies in this battle. Why?

Studies have shown that 1) faith is one of the most important influences in the lives of 8 out of ten people, providing comfort and peace; 2) spirituality is an important part of recovery for many people; 3) teens who are frequent religious service attendees have a lower than average risk for drug and alcohol problems; 4) social support from friends and outside influence can moderate the effects of a family history of drug and alcohol problems; 5) children who coped effectively with the trauma of growing up in families affected by alcoholism often relied on the support of nonalcoholic parent, stepparent, grandparent, teacher or others when they were growing up; 6)a student's ability to resist drugs include positive peer affiliations, bonding/involvement is school activities, relationships with caring adults, opportunities for school success and responsible behavior, and the availability of drug-free activities. So communities of faith are being asked to join in this effort. But this isn't new to Concordia. For years we have not only shared the Good News of Christ's atoning grace, but we have also share practical advice, and provided support for those seeking release from the bondage of addiction through our own ministry called Tools for Living and our Thursday evening 5:30 p.m. meeting called the Recovery Room where we share our experience, strength and hope.

But with all the evidence that drug and alcohol abuse is a problem why don't more people seek help? According to the ADAD newsletter "The stigma surrounding drug and alcohol addiction has created a tremendous barrier for millions of individuals who need treatment, but who do not get it. Stigma is identified as the most firmly entrenched obstacle for faith communities to overcome." All of us have friends, and family members who drink or abuse other drugs. Perhaps it's a problem in your own home. If it is a problem within your home, or a home of a friend don't let the stigma keep you from getting the help you need. Let go of your pride or fear and let us help. It's confidential, it's inspiring and you are always welcome, we are so glad you came. September is National Alcohol and Drug Addiction Recovery Month. Please pray for our recovery ministry here at Concordia and for those you know who need the Good News of God's grace and a friend to welcome them to a life free from the bondage of addiction.








