

Dear friends, October, '03

For someone as people-oriented as I am, living 20 minutes outside of town in a beautiful house, with no neighbors, no friends my age, and only actually knowing just a handful of people, these first few weeks were a little rough. 
It is good to know You! In Your Name we pray,

A Personal Evangelism Conference October 31-November 1, 2003, Denver CO

There are two major developments to report this week regarding the Conversations of Grace Conference. We are pleased to announce the details of a bonus workshop to be offered at the conference by outreach experts from our national office. We are also quite excited to report that we will be offering a Spanish language track for our conference.

Bonus Workshop! Adding to an already full program, a workshop will be offered during the Saturday lunch break by Rev. Dr. Yohannes Mengstaeb, Synodical Director of Urban and Multi-ethnic Missions of the Board for Mission Services, and by Rev. Roger Altenberger, Director of Outreach and Revitalization.

Sharing this hour, Mengstaeb will discuss his insights on doing outreach cross-culturally, and Altenberger will present ideas on using small group ministry for evangelism. Grab your box lunch, and be sure to take advantage of this special opportunity at the conference.

"Converaciones de Gracias" (Spanish Language Track) - Did you know that twenty-five percent of the residents of the Rocky Mountain District reported in the last census that they were Hispanic? The number of Hispanic ministries and Latinos in our congregations is increasing. The hope of the conference steering committee is that outreach to this large group in our District can be strengthened by offering this opportunity. The plenary sessions will be translated and a Spanish language workshop track will be presented.

Workshop presenters will be: Rev. Juan Hormachea, the RMD Hispanic Ministry Facilitator and pastor of Cordero de Dios Lutheran Church in Denver; Rev. Karl Heimer, pastor/missionary of San Pablo Lutheran Church/Ysleta Lutheran Mission, El Paso, TX; Dr. Al Diaz, Hispanic leader of Mission Lutheran Church, Las Cruces, NM and member of the RMD Board of Directors, and Mr. Wilson Bensus, a native of Peru and mission developer of a Hispanic ministry at Christ Our Savior Lutheran Church, Longmont, CO.


-There will be a sign up for people to work the sale. We always need lots of help on Friday and for clean up on Saturday.



TOOLS FOR LIVING

STEP 12

"Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to others, and to practice these principles in all our affairs."

Although we enter recover to heal a particular affliction, we find that, in the end, we have received far more than a specific healing of an addiction; we have received the gift of a profound spiritual awakening. In a sense, the addiction, the pain, the healing of the addiction, have only been stepping-stones to spiritual transformation and renewal. There is a phrase from the oral tradition of A.A. and other Twelve Step groups, by which people in meetings introduce themselves: "Hi, I'm _______, and I'm a grateful recovering alcoholic." What they mean is that there is an element of gratitude for their addiction or dependency since it has served as the key to a spiritual awakening.

The second phrase in Step 12 reads: "we tried to carry this message to others". Twelve Step programs place great emphasis on outreach to those who still suffer. Another oral tradition says, "You can't keep it unless you give it away." Having received healing and spiritual renewal, we can retain them only as we offer them to others. This evangelism aspect of Twelve Step recovery provides a bridge between recovery programs and the Christian church, which has a two thousand-year history of evangelism.

On a practical level, psychologists have long believed that there is a special capacity for empathy between persons who have shared the same addictions. That is why Bill Wilson encouraged alcoholics to help other alcoholics, and it is also why we now have such a proliferation of recovery support groups for different dependencies. Again, the premise is that people who have suffered from an addiction and have found spiritual healing from it are in better positions to understand and help others with similar problems.

The final phrase in Step 12 emphasizes practicing the Twelve Step principles "in all our affairs". This means that if we have been spiritually transformed, people will begin to observe it in our financial lives, in our relationships, in our community lives, in our sexual conduct, and the list goes on and on. Our transformation will be apparent in all arenas of our lives.

Healing our addictions or co-dependencies is not the only goal of recovery. Rather, it is the starting place. Certainly we have to cap our additions and put them in a state of balance or abstinence. But then begins the real journey of spiritual growth. Can our lives be remade?

We must remember that this growth is a process with one of the growth directions being toward God. Bill Wilson left the door open, saying, "It's God as I understand Him," but he was very explicit about who his God was. He was the God of our fathers and of the Lord Jesus Christ. We may start as agnostics. We may then come to view the group or recovery process as our higher power, looking to other people for strength. Gradually we accept a vague notion of god, which grows to a more specific monotheistic god. Eventually, we come to know the on true God.

If you are growing and searching for the true God, may we suggest the God of the Scriptures? Spending time reading Serenity and meditating on it can help you come to know this caring, loving, and merciful Father.
