



Words from Ellie Bach

Hello Members of Concordia,

November '03

This past week I was reading a devotion by Ken Gire that talked about the things we say with our lives. It got me thinking about what message my life was giving. Am I showing people Christ? Do the things I say and do reflect God's love even when I'm not trying to? Saint Francis of Assisi said, "Where ever you go preach Christ. And if you have to, use words." I love that. I want to share this devotion with you because I think it is important for us to be conscience of what we tell people with our lifestyle. God calls us to be holy and righteous, to be perfect and blameless. We cannot do this on our own, but we have Christ. He makes us righteous in God's sight—praise God! I challenge you this month to take a look at your life and figure out what you're saying. And then live in the knowledge that though our efforts toward perfection fall short, Christ carries us the rest of the way. And know that God uses us to witness to others despite our shortcomings.

The devotion starts with the story of Lot's wife:

"...In that backward glance of longing for the life she left behind, Lot's wife passed from the realm of the living to the realm of parable. Though she is dead, the message of her life lives on.

Stories of people like Lot's wife make the theoretical practical. They put flesh and blood on bare-bones principles. They incarnate the Word so that it may dwell among us. To be seen and heard. To be touched and understood.

In the winding and sometime precarious road we travel on our spiritual journey, other people's lives serve as signposts, showing us the way or the way to avoid.

The rich man and Lazarus. The tax collector and the Pharisee. The Pharisee and the prostitute.

Each points us either in the direction we should go or in the direction we shouldn't.

Of all the people's lives that have become parables, none is so instructive, so inspiring, as the life of the Savior.

He etched in our minds an image of tenderness when He invited the children to come to Him. He showed us a picture of compassion when He raised the widow of Nain's son. He silhouetted a profile of courage when He stood against the hypocrisy of the Pharisees. He sketched a mural of meekness when He rode into Jerusalem on the colt of a donkey. He sculpted the form of a servant when He washed the feet of His disciples. He drew a portrait of a friend when He surrendered His life for us. He showed us with graphic realism what it meant to love our enemies when, impaled on a Roman cross, He asked the Father to forgive those who had put Him there.

He was a walking parable. Showing us how to love, how to live, and how to die. Giving us pictures that pointed the way.

Remember Him.

Remember Lot's wife.

And remember that one day you will be remembered too. By someone struggling along life's path. By someone groping to find the way. By someone for whom your life has become a parable.

October Reflections

The falling leaves, the honking of geese and frost in mornings brings seasonal thoughts that reoccur every October. Thoughts of hunting, the World Series, mounting snow tires, garage cleaning, the rummage sale, the Reformation and Martin Luther are on the list.

I confess that thoughts of hunting sometimes get more attention then thoughts of the church. But I guess I had better share some thoughts about Martin Luther and the Reformation, since this is a church newsletter and not an outdoor sports magazine.

Our church celebrates the Reformation in late October. Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the church door on October 31st (the Eve Of All Hallows) because he knew that many people would see these as they came to church the next day for the observance of All Saints Day. His theses along with his outspokenness against the un-biblical actions of the Church at that time spawned a reformation among Christians. Because of this, we are no longer separated from God by the church and we can speak to Him directly. We now know that the Church does not have the power to withhold forgiveness from truly repentant people in order to extort monetary indulgence. We can celebrate All Saints Day merely for the remembrance of the believers who have gone before us instead of having to purchase the souls of our dead relatives out of purgatory. We know that no act of penance earns our salvation as all have fallen short, but we are saved by faith in the death and resurrection of Christ.

Besides the Reformation, Martin Luther also gave us many good things to help us in our relationship with God. He translated the Bible into the language of common people so that we are not dependant on priests to dole out the Word to us. He encouraged all believers to be diligent in their study of the Word. Luther believed that parents should share the responsibility with the church of educating their children in Christianity. He gave us the catechism (a collection and explanation of Bible verses) so that parents could instruct their children at home in matters of faith. Luther wrote volumes of material to help us understand the importance of the Sacraments of Baptism and Communion and how to practice them with the acknowledgement that God is truly present in them. And Martin Luther wrote many of the hymns that we love to sing such as <u>From Heaven Above</u>, <u>We All Believe In One True God</u>, <u>Savior Of The Nations</u>, <u>Come</u>, and <u>A Mighty Fortress is our God</u>, A trusty Shield and Weapon; He helps us free from every need That hath us now o'er-taken.

Thanks to All Who Participated in the "Crop Walk"


