From his paper entitled: "The Office of the Pastoral Ministry and the Priesthood of All Believers"

...."God has established the pastoral office and He fills it through the congregation's call. C.F.W. Walther very properly emphasized this truth in his theses on the ministry. In the first of his theses Vom Heiligen Predigtamt Oder Pfarramt, Walther states that "the holy ministry, or the pastoral office (Pfarramt), is an office distinct from the priestly office, which belongs to all believers." On the basis of the Scriptures Walther shows "that there is in the church an office for teaching, shepherding, governing, etc., which does not belong to Christians by reason of their general Christian calling." Just as all are not called to be apostles, so not all are to be pastors. God Himself has ordained the office of the public ministry. This office did not appear as the result of a process of evolutionary development in the church, designed merely to meet utilitarian concern. Nor did it originate as the byproduct of first-century wisdom or the enlightened discretion of early leaders, as if to say that the church created the ministry. Rather, God called the pastoral ministry into existence. It was God's idea that this office exists. And, to be sure, He instituted this office for the sake of good order in the church.

Christ, the head Shepherd of His church, directed that there would not only be apostles for the founding of the church, but He also provided for their successors in the preaching of the office (Acts 20:17, 28; 2 Timothy 2:2). There would be this difference between them: the apostles entered their office through the direct call of Christ, their Lord; their successors, or undershepherds, enter the preaching office through the call of the congregations they are to serve (Acts 14:23). The apostles and their under-studies guide the congregations and also regularly ordain the new incumbents of the pastoral office (Titus 1:5, 7; 1 Timothy 3:2; Acts 6:3, 6).

The apostle Peter recognizes the legitimacy and validity of his fellow elders or pastors who, like he, tended the flock of God faithfully and humbly (1 Peter 5:1-4). Paul reminds the elders of the congregation at Ephesus that it is by the will of the Holy Spirit that they are "to feed the church of God, which he purchased with his own blood" (Acts 20:28). Numerous other New Testament references bear out the divine origin of the pastoral office (cf. John 21:15-17; 1 Cor. 3:5; 4:1; 9:14; 12:28; Eph. 4:11; Col. 1:7; 1 Tim. 5:17; 2 Tim 2:1; Heb. 13:17). The office of the Christian pastor, therefore, is grounded in God's express will and may be regarded as an extension of the apostolic office and therefore also of Christ's own ministry.

Dear Friends,

November, '04

Have you ever been in an earthquake? I have not, but I have seen its devastating effects. I can't imagine being in a place where the very ground you walk on can become unstable at any moment. I take great comfort in knowing that the ground we walk on is not going anywhere.

How does a stable place to walk compare to our faith? I love the hymn "My hope is built on nothing less." Read these words from the first verse: "My hope is built on nothing less Than Jesus' blood and righteousness; No merit of my own I claim but wholly lean on



Jesus' Name. On Christ, the solid rock, I stand; All other ground is sinking sand." I love that! How true it is that our faith should be only in one place—Christ and His grace. Sometimes I find myself unwittingly putting my faith somewhere else; and it usually takes a two-by-four to show me I'm a little off kilter. Sometimes I put it in my own understanding or knowledge. Sometimes I put it in other people. Sometimes I put it in the church itself. But then I am reminded that the only safe place to put my faith and trust is in Christ. He is the sure foundation on which we can build. For those of you who do any kind of construction you know that without a good foundation the building, no matter how well it's built, is no good.

Some people still think that part of your way to heaven is how good of a person you are or how well you live your life. While Christ calls us to live a life set apart, it is not how we get to heaven. If even part of your foundation is built on that, your "house" is unstable. "On Christ the solid rock, I stand; All other ground is sinking sand." I don't know about you, but I'm very thankful that I do not, at any time, have to rely on myself to live "good enough" or be "nice enough" or treat others "well enough." You and I can find comfort in our sure Foundation. We can be at peace knowing that we have our faith built on the Solid Rock.

The kids choir sings a song that talks about not building your house on the sandy land, but on the Rock, because when the storms come, the sand shifts and your house washes away. Building your house on the Rock assures us that our house will stand despite the storms. Read the second verse: "When darkness veils his lovely face, I rest on His unchanging grace; In every high and stormy gale My anchor holds within the veil." Sometimes during the storms we may feel like God is nowhere to be found, or that we are left to weather its fierceness on our own. But when we build our house with Christ as our foundation, we are standing on the safest place there is. Despite the winds of a storm or the shaking of an earthquake, we can have confidence in our foundation, in our LORD and Savior Jesus Christ.

Some of us may feel like we're standing in an earthquake. But don't lose hope. Put your faith in Christ to get you through. This month, thank God for showing us the best "land" on which to build our house. And thank Him for "weather-proofing" the house in which we live. Find peace this month in the faithfulness of God through life's storms.

"Now it is God who makes both us and you stand firm in Christ. He anointed us, set His seal of ownership on us, and put His Spirit in our hearts as a deposit, guaranteeing what is to come."

Study links watching sex on TV to teen sex

Children who watched a lot of TV with sexual content were about twice as likely to start having intercourse during the subsequent year as those with little exposure to televised sex, researchers found.

High exposure to TV sex among those ages 12 to 17 also was linked with a lower but still substantially increased risk of starting non-intercourse behavior, including passionate kissing and oral sex, the researchers found. Even shows that only refer to sex but don't depict it had the effect, they found.

"Exposure to TV that included only talk about sex was associated with the same risks as exposure to TV that depicted sexual behavior," said Rand Corp. behavioral scientist Rebecca Collins and colleagues.

From innuendoes to depictions of intercourse, sex is pervasive on TV, present in about two-thirds of all shows other than news and sports, and teens watch an average of three hours of television daily, previous research has shown. TV thus "may create the illusion that sex is more central to daily life than it truly is and may promote sexual initiation as a result," the researchers said.

"When they're watching it for three hours a day, it really does become their social world. Those characters are people they identify with and pay attention to," said Collins, the lead researcher.

TV sex rarely deals with negative aspects most teens aren't prepared to deal with, including unwanted pregnancy, AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases, she said.


That "sends kids the message that everybody's having sex and nobody's thinking about responsibility and nothing bad ever happens," Collins said.

The study appears in September's Pediatrics, released today. The results are based on nationwide telephone surveys of 1,792 adolescents queried in 2001 and again in 2002. Parental consent for participation was obtained before the interviews.

The researchers devised a list of 23 popular shows that on average featured abundant sexual content.

'Programs the researchers considered high in sexual content included "that '70s Show," "Friends" and "Sex and the City"—all popular with teens.




Sr. High Volleyball Tournament

HERE COMES THE GREAT AMERICAN SMOKEOUT!

Are you ready for 24 hours without cigarettes? That's what the Great American Smokeout is all about. Each year on the third Thursday of November, the American Cancer Society (ACS) organizes the smokeout. According to ACS, more Americans try to quit smoking on this day than any other day of the year, including New Year's Day.

What does it take to participate? Just you. There's nothing to join or buy or sign up for. You simply commit to quit for day. You can do that, right?

FOLLOW A PLAN OF ACTION:

If you are reading this you have already started "the plan". You've already decided that you want to know more about quitting. The first step is to make a decision that you want to quit. Also, be sure you WHY you are quitting. Is it to improve your health? Save money? Improve your love life? Get a clear picture in your mind of the reason you want to quit so you have a clear end goal.

PREPARE AND SUCCEED:

The next step is to get ready to quit. Most successful quitters don't just finish a cigarette, then say "That's the last cigarette I'll ever smoke", and quit on a whim. Instead, successful quitters prepare for the day when they will quit.

To prepare for your quit, decide what day you will quit. In this case, plan to quit on the Great American Smokeout day. You'll have lots of other people around you doing the same thing, plus support on the radio, TV and other media.

DECIDE HOW YOU'LL QUIT:

Decide on the method you'll use to quit. Will you quit cold turkey and use sheer willpower to quit? Or will you opt to use nicotine patches or nicotine gum? What about gradually reducing the number of cigarettes you smoke each day?

Visit http://www.quitsmoking.com for many different methods, ideas and products that you can use to quit. KEEP THE NICODEMON AWAY:

Once you've decided on your method for quitting, and actually quit, you'll be tempted to smoke again. You can make staying quit easier if you follow some simple guidelines:

Stay away from other smokers. Discard all your cigarettes, lighters and ashtrays. Don't leave anything in your environment that might remind you or tempt you to smoke. Stay out of convenience stores or other places where you purchase cigarettes. When you have a bad craving for a cigarette, take a deep breath, drink some water, go for a short walk, or something else to distract yourself. Cravings will subside in a minute or two, whether or not you smoke.

Exercise! The benefits to smokers are tremendous. You'll improve your health. You'll find that quitting is much easier when you are exercising. Exercising can easily relieve stress that you tried to relieve by smoking. Smoking and exercise are not compatible. Let exercise replace smoking in your life! Plan rewards for yourself. Quitting smoking is a BIG DEAL and anyone who does it deserves a big reward. Of course, quitting itself is the biggest reward, but you should make a list of rewards that you'll give yourself when you pass certain milestones. For example, after a week of being smoke-free, you might buy yourself a CD or movie. After one month, go out for a nice dinner. After 6 months or a year, take a reward vacation.

Write down the rewards. Put them on a calendar and give yourself a goal to work toward. With all the money you'll save by not smoking, you'll be able to afford to reward yourself!

NOW GET STARTED:

The Great American Smokeout is a great way to prove to yourself that you can quit for a day. But if you can quit for one day, you can surely quit for a week, or a month or a year. Give it a chance and next year you won't have to think about the Smokeout. Re-read this article, then follow the directions. It's simple and within your reach. Update On Our Journey to Our Next Pastor

Pastor Ed Schmidt who is the circuit counselor will be caring for Concordia until we get a replacement pastor. He will be contacted for a list of "visiting" pastors that may be able to come to our church to provide occasional Sunday services.

We have been in conversation with Pastor Schmidt regarding an Interim pastor. He indicated to me Pastor Golter, is searching within and outside of the district. There are possible candidates, however, it is still too preliminary for any information. The likelihood is a delay of two to four months. However, there is a likelihood that we may have available a vacancy pastor within a month who would help us through the end of the year and possibly until we have an Interim.

Regarding the Interim and time ahead:

The Interim is trained to do much of what Peacemakers is designed to do.

A vote needs to be taken by voters to call an Interim Pastor who would serve from one to two years.

Pastor Ed suggested that to not call an Interim could make it difficult to call a pastor and have it accepted. As it is not unusual for the word to be out when a congregation has difficulties.


There needs to be a time of healing.

Brenda was a young woman who was invited to go rock climbing. Although she was very scared, she went with her group to a tremendous granite cliff. In spite of her fear, she put on the gear, took hold of the rope, and started up the face of that rock. Well, she got to a ledge where she could take a breather. As she was hanging on there, the safety rope snapped against Brenda's eye and knocked out her contact lens.

Well, here she is, on a rock ledge, with hundreds of feet below her and hundreds of feet above her.
