From his paper entitled: "The Office of the Pastoral Ministry and the Priesthood of All Believers" cont.

The office of the public ministry has been instituted by God for the public proclamation of the Gospel and the administration of the sacraments. These functions were originally carried out by the apostles, who were called into the apostolate directly by Christ. The occupants of the office of the public ministry, however, are now to be chosen or elected mediately through the instrumentality of the royal priesthood in a given locale. It is with them that the ultimate authority for administering the means of grace lies.

The key issue here is a recognition of the authority given by God to all believers. By assiduous study of Scripture, the Lutheran Confessions, and the writings of Luther, C.F. W. Walther came to see how central the doctrine of the priesthood of all believers is for the proper understanding of the doctrines of church and ministry. Walter's understanding of this doctrine enabled him to set to the side both the presumptuous threats of hierarchical tyranny on the part of the clergy and also populist and uncontrolled overreaching by the laity. According to Walther, it is God's express will that a local congregation (or group of congregations) fill this high office by electing a qualified man to carry out its functions. In so choosing, the members of the priesthood of believers do not surrender their sovereign rights or powers. What the pastor is to do in the stead and name of the congregation remains fundamentally the responsibility of the priesthood of believers, and it would be correct to say, therefore, that a pastor does no more, and can do no more, than what a congregation itself has the authority to do. Nor does the congregation's call diminish in the slightest the divine nature of the office of the public ministry.

Now is not the time for us Lutherans to quarrel about the doctrine of the ministry. Ordinarily, those priests who have not been recognized by the church through the apostolic custom of ordination ought not carry out the distinctive functions of the pastoral office such as public preaching and public administration of the sacraments. To say this, in no way minimizes the importance of the priesthood of all believers. Nor is this to deny that there may be rare and unusual situations when exceptions can and should be made. The doctrine of the priesthood of all believers does not contradict the Scriptural truth that the pastoral office is divinely instituted, that this office is God's will for the sake of good order in the church, that one of the priests who possesses the Scriptural qualifications of this office be selected to hold this office in the congregation and carry out the distinctive functions of this office publicly—i.e., in behalf of and with accountability to the others.

But having said this, it is high time that we in the Missouri Synod reclaim our Reformation heritage, that we take the doctrine of the priestly office of all the baptized out of the slogan category and put it to work in the living theology and practice of our life together in the church. May God grant it!

Shared fully. Not partially. Not nearly. Not to a large degree. Entirely! Jesus shared fully.


In all our experience. Every hurt. Each ache. All the stresses and all the strains. No exceptions. No substitutes. Why? So he could sympathize with our weaknesses.



MATCHING GRANT FUND ALLOCATION

Just an update to keep you informed about the matching grant funds and how they are being dispersed. The amounts that were specified for a specific ministry have been paid as follows: Christ-Aid \$179; Missions \$36; Pre-school \$16; Mortgage principle payment \$12360; Sunday School \$358; Youth \$358; Joel Scheiwe LCMS World Missions \$895; Music/Sound \$448. Total specified paid: \$14650. Total unspecified amount was \$98534. 10%, \$9853 (our tithe) goes to missions. We voted to pay for Joel Scheiwe's first year of mission/vicarage \$8000 total. \$895 specified + \$7105 from the tithe of the unspecified. This leaves \$2749 of our tithe for missions, and \$88,680 unspecified. We have used this amount to meet our financial obligations to the Rocky Mountain District in the amount of approx. \$8000 leaving \$80,680 unspecified. The Trustees are getting bids on repairs needed at the parsonage and some of this remaining money will be used towards that. If you have any questions or suggestions for ministry opportunities for the remaining money please contact Brian Thornton or one of your Council members. Thanks.
